Message from the President

Season 2018/19 was a season that started with a lot of promise, however for various reasons, it was not the season we had hoped for.

We finished 8th in the club championship, two places down from last season and made less semi's than last season. The shining light was winning the Metropolitan Cup with our Colts team, an excellent performance by a team of young cricketers that did our club proud in both the Semi and Grand Final, completing comprehensive victories. We continued to perform strongly in both Green Shield and Poidevin Gray and this, augers well for our future success. Our first-grade side made the semi-finals of the Limited Over competition and 4th grade again made the finals only to have their chances washed out in the qualifying final.

I wrote last year that we needed to start the season strongly, however we were unable again to do this and to be perfectly honest the tone was set at pre-season training where numbers were low and intensity was missing. We need to address this next season, to ensure we get off to a strong start and let momentum hopefully gather to produce high level results.

Off the field we continued to survive, but my two big concerns going forward is funding and volunteers. The reality is we are struggling in both areas and without new ideas and new people assisting in running the club, I worry about our future. Cricket Australia and Cricket NSW need to focus on premier cricket, as we are expected to run almost a semi-professional club by a bunch of well-intentioned and "old" volunteers that do everything for our cub out of their love for the game and their club. However, we cannot keep going for ever without addressing the funding issues and lack of volunteers. Cricket Australia and Cricket NSW we need your meaningful assistance, not words but actions.

In order for our club to function, as well as it does we are reliant on a number of groups of people that all have a profound influence on our club, as follows:

Players

There is no doubt we have a core group of very committed players that have performed strongly on the field for some years now. With our junior development and country program we also have a strong nursery for attracting new young players to our club. However, there appears to be a belief by some, that these new players coming into our club negatively impacts the club, our players need to embrace these new players and challenge themselves to lift their individual and therefore team performances. This is what will make us a club that seriously competes for the club championship.

Tym along with the other members of our Player's Committee, Dan Stickland, Ryan Tullia and Matt Keane did a great job especially in assisting with the re-structuring of trainings in the second half of the season that had positive results, as well as conducting surveys that give us valuable insight on the players views to assist us in running a better club.



Obituary

ANDY MCELROY

The Club lost a loyal servant when Andy passed away on 19th March, 2019. Starting in 1970-71 season he played sixteen seasons with Gordon and in that time, as mainly a medium pace bowler, took part in the Club Championship 1974-75 season as a member of the Premiership Fourth Grade and Poidevin-Gray Shield teams. Andy was part of four premierships in lower grades, the last one in 1985-86 as captain of the undefeated Third Grade team. In 1982-83 he won the Bert Oldfield Trophy for All-Round Performances taking 35 wickets at average of 18.7 and 293 runs at 32.5 average, including two half centuries.

Andy sits at Number 13 in the All Grades Bowling list having taken 453 wickets at only 16.65 average. In recent years Andy often called in to Chatswood Oval to watch 1st Grade play and have a few drinks with mates. To his wife and family the Club sends its condolences.

Financial & Auditors Report

On behalf of the Management Committee of Gordon District Cricket Club Inc (GDCC) I am pleased to report on the financial position of GDCC as at 31 May 2019 and the financial performance of its operations for the year then ended.

For the financial year GDCC reported a statutory profit of \$2,084 (2018 \$9,962). Unlike an "ordinary" business which is aimed at making profits, GDCC is a "social" business. Profits are important as they make the Club self-sustaining. For this reason your Club must and is run as a business. However the ultimate goal is

maximizing the social benefits derived by the community through involvement in cricket and associated social events. This stretches from the five year old Junior Blast player to the former player who attends the Golf Day and Dinner.

The Junior Club is one of the largest clubs in the NSJCA competition. It was pleasing after two years of declining registered player numbers that there was a marginal increase this season. The greatest challenge faced by NSJCA is the failure by State Government and Local Government to invest in new playing fields. Coupled with an increasing population this has resulted in a lack of affordable available grounds which have the facilities and playing surfaces needed to deliver a great playing experience. The Junior Club is proud of its Community Club status. The Management Committee is extremely conscious of the need to ensure that the Junior Club remains affordable and inclusive.

This year it was pleasing that GDCC was again able to field six grade teams. The cost of fielding six grade teams, U21 Poidevin-Gray and U16 Green Shield teams was \$190,800. To keep the playing fees affordable for a largely student playing cohort means that GDCC is heavily reliant on grants from Cricket NSW, the ongoing generosity and support of the Club's sponsors, in particular our major sponsor Beastwear and golf day fundraising activities. It would be remiss not to acknowledge those people who chose to support the Club by taking up an Associate Membership or provided services without charge.

GDCC remains in a strong financial position with member's funds of \$111,023 (2018 \$ 108,939) and a significant cash reserve.

On behalf of the Management Committee I would like to acknowledge and thank Cricket NSW, the Club's sponsors and all those involved in the Golf Day function for their support of the Club.

Notes to and forming part of the financial statements For the year ended 31 May 2019

1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

a Basis of preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for the members of Gordon District Cricket Club Inc. for the purpose of fulfilling the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009.

The Club is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Gordon District Cricket Club Inc. applies Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

b Revenue recognition

Membership fees, sponsorship and coaching grants are recognised in the period to which they relate. Coaching fees are recognised upon the delivery of the service. Sales of goods are recognised at the time of sale to the customer.

Facilities development grants are recognised over the estimated useful lives of the items of plant and equipment for which the grant was received.

Other income is recognised when received.

c Expenses

Expenses were recorded in the financial statements on an accruals basis so that expenses are matched against income and recognised in the year to which they relate.

d Inventories

Inventories comprise stocks of cricket balls held for future use and club shirts and hats held for resale. Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

e Property, plant and equipment

Items of cricket equipment are initially recorded at cost and depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Property plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets future use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are: Cricket equipment 20%-25% straight line Motor Vehicles 20% straight line

f Facilities development grants

The Club received facilities development grants from government and sporting organisations to assist with the purchase of depreciable plant and equipment. These grants are recognised as revenue over the estimated useful lives of those items of plant and equipment for which the grant was received.

The portion of the facilities development grants attributable to future financial periods is shown as either a current or non-current other liability on the Statement of Financial Position.

g Creditors

i Income Tax

The Club is a not-for-profit entity under Australian Income Tax legislation. Whilst the sole purpose and operations of the Club remains the promotion and provision of cricket to members of the Club it will remain exempt from income tax.

k Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an expense.

Accruals are stated exclusive of GST. The outstanding amount of GST payable to the ATO is included in Payables.

Scope

I have audited the financial report of the Gordon District Cricket Club Inc. for the year ended 31st May 2019 as set out on pages 13-24.

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee has much pleasure in submitting for the members' consideration and adoption, the One Hundred and Fourteenth Annual Report and Balance Sheet. This report is in the format that various sub-committees report to the Executive Committee.

Andrew Falk

GENERAL - ADMINISTRATION

During the recent off-season period, members of the Executive Committee assembled for a Planning Day. Such topics as Club Culture, Match Day Management, Improving Club Funding, Identifying and Prioritising Facilities/Equipment Requirements and Building the Volunteer Base were identified as being critical to the Club's short and medium term development. While Gordon is considered by other clubs and players as being slightly higher than an "average" achiever on and off the field, work needs to be done on each of these "background" assignments for the Club to maintain, and hopefully improve on, current standards.

Substantial work has been done over the past twelve months in the area of Strategy & Development. This has been driven by Club Director, Vaughn Richtor. Many meetings have been attended with various staff members of Cricket NSW, our two Local Councils, Macquarie University, local Shires cricket clubs and various other stakeholders in cricket in our region. Behind all of this is the Club's desire to improve our facilities and ensure their availability into the future. There is a paucity of indoor training facilities and synthetic outdoor nets in our region, not only for the Men's Club but for our ever-expanding Women's and Junior Clubs. The facilities that we offer our members and visitors at our three home grounds are "reasonable" but they are significantly behind those offered by many of the Premier clubs across the Sydney basin. Vaughn and his team are starting to make inroads into this space but, with limited funding available, progress tends to be protracted.

As reported in last year's Annual Report, Willoughby Council had developed a Chatswood Park Master Plan for input by various stakeholders and users of the Park. Despite significant time being put into preparing recommendations for inclusion into this Plan (in concert with the Women's and Junior Clubs and the winter hirer of Chatswood oval, the Gordon Rugby Club), the outcomes were disappointing. However, on a brighter note, the facilities at Beauchamp Park are in the process of being upgraded and a complete re-laying of the turf outfield (with couch grass rather than kikuyu) was carried out during the summer.

Special mention needs to be recorded of Tim Cubbage's amazing contribution to the day-to-day running of the Club in so many areas. Tim apparently "wants his Saturdays back" (what a ludicrous statement that is!) so he will be stepping back from several of his responsibilities next season. We are going to have to find about 10 people to cover Tim's workload!

The Annual Golf Day is a major revenue source for the Club each season. This year, due to refurbishment of the greens at Killara Golf Club, we needed to find a new venue. Geoff Hickman, Paul Stephenson and a small sub-committee set about organising this day at Avondale Golf Club in May rather than in February as had been the date on previous occasions. Despite being "out of season", the day was an outstanding success with Special Guest(s), The Grade Cricketer, providing the entertainment at the after-golf dinner.

Peter Klemt again provided the link with our sponsors and, in addition coordinated the End-of-Season Awards function at the Kirribilli Club in April. This was another most enjoyable evening for all in attendance, albeit that (again) it would have been even better with additional support from the players (for whose benefit it is staged).

Michael Cant headed the Club's Cricket Committee with responsibility for recruitment, retention of players, selections, coaching and training. With three Preliminary rounds of the competition to play, Gordon was looking at the prospect of having 1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th (Colts) Grades into the Finals Series. Three very ordinary rounds later and only 4th Grade and Colts made the playoffs. Despite the poor finish to the season, the Club managed to remain in the top half of the Club Championship finishing in 8th position. Colts were worthy winners of the Metropolitan Cup but points from this competition do not contribute to the NSW Premier Cricket Club Championship.

Geoff Keevers, Treasurer. Extraordinary, outstanding, exceptional, stupendous, dazzling, marvelous, remarkable and superior – we are VERY lucky!

Bob Thomas, who was officially a member of the Executive Committee for the first time, in his role as Junior Development and Country Liaison Director, continued to identify country players for inclusion in the Club's expanding and successful Country Program. Talented players from various regions across NSW are provided opportunities at the Club to play at various levels from Green Shield through Poidevin Gray to Grade. Bob also ran the Club's (Junior) Academy and was one of two Club Selectors. Thanks to Bob for fulfilling these roles.

Our thanks go again to Paul Stephenson for his continued driving of the Club's communications. Plenty seems to be happening each week during the season with the website, the Team App and various forms of social media. Paul's website articles around ANZAC Day each year are always a treat. Meanwhile Damon Lesnie's and Tony Wilson's input of photos onto the Club's Facebook page is outstanding.

Jim Cattlin retained the role as Club Secretary for a 12th year and, although he does not sit on the EC, provided much of the day-to-day communications with local councils and other clubs.

Scott Hinton attended most EC meetings during the season, officially as a "guest". Scott has a great understanding of what is happening at DCA level in Sydney through his involvement at the North Shore District Cricket Association as well as through the Gordon Junior Cricket Club. Our thanks go to Scott and also to Dave Bezer, the President of the Junior Club, for their assistance and support throughout the season. These two are very experienced campaigners in sport in our region.

Andrew Falk, as Assistant Secretary, provided liaison with the Sydney Cricket Association and Cricket NSW, as required, including player registrations and publication of team selections into the myCricket and revolutioniseSPORT facilities. (revolutioniseSPORT is a club management system which, among other things, keeps track of memberships and bulk communications to member groups.)

MEN'S CRICKET

Marshall Rosen and Andrew Falk have been the Club's delegates to the Sydney Cricket Association for the past twenty years. Marshall, after several years as a State Selector, will shortly complete his 13th year as a Director of Cricket NSW. He remains the Chair of the Cricket NSW Cricket Committee. Andrew, after 16 years on the SCA's Committee of Management, was re-elected for his sixth term as Chairman at the SCA's AGM in August 2018.

For a fourth year, the Australian Cricketers' Association (ACA) allocated funds to every Premier Club across Australia to be paid to an ACA Member to coach and/or play for that club. This season, funds were also available for female Premier clubs. Again this season, these funds were used to utilise the services of Trevor Chappell as the Club's Head Coach while our Women's Club also benefitted from this funding.

This season, the inaugural National Premier T20 Championships were held in Adelaide. The winners of each state and territory's Premier T20 competitions competed over two days. NSW was represented by the two KST20 conference winners, Sydney University (Thunder) and Sutherland (Sixers). This (fully funded by CA) carnival was reported to be highly successful and it is intended to be continued in future seasons, albeit with additional preliminary rounds.

At the end of April, an inaugural combined male and female Premiers' Dinner and Presentation function was held at Dockside, Cockle Bay. Despite some skepticism from many of those who had attended individual presentations on previous occasions, this was an outstanding success. Unfortunately, there was insufficient time to include some of the "minor" awards (e.g. grounds of the year, media awards, captains of the year, etc.) although these were acknowledged separately.

Significant funding continues to be provided to Premier Clubs in NSW by McDonalds, Kookaburra, Cricketers Arms (Asahi) and Kingsgrove Sports. These sponsorships are greatly appreciated by all clubs.

Strategy and Development Report

The Club has followed a strategy in recent years that has seen results in terms of increased revenues, improvements to facilities, investment in and adoption of new technology to improve communication and information flow and, ultimately a steady improvement in performance and onfield results. Nonetheless, the need to constantly improve all aspects of the running of the club necessitate a reassessment of the current overall position and identification of key areas that require attention.

With that in mind the Club has embarked on the development of a new medium-term plan, addressing the key strategic priorities going forward. The plan is summarised below. In addition, the club has given increased focus to how we wish to be perceived as a sporting club and how we play the game. The "Gordon Spirit" encapsulates the key values we hold as a club, and the associated behaviours expected from all our constituents. Research within the club to determine the Gordon Spirit has been undertaken and a two page summary follows this report.

Our mission is to be regarded as New South Wales's leading Premier Cricket Club. As a participant in the NSW Premier Cricket competition we strive to lead the way not only in performances on the field but also in the administration of the club, coaching and facilities and the development of players as cricketers and team members.

While we are a cricket club that seeks to compete effectively in the Sydney Premier Cricket Competition, we recognise that we have a role to play in building the great game of cricket and broadening its appeal across demographics and providing recreational opportunities to the residents of the North Shore, whether that be in playing or watching the game. By providing the opportunities for cricketers to develop their capabilities to reach the highest level of performance that they wish to achieve, including the provision of a pathway to the elite levels of cricket, we see our role to broaden the appeal of the sport and to help cricketers achieve their full potential – inspiring a passion for cricket across Sydney's North Shore.

We have identified four strategic pillars of focus in the coming years;

1. IMPROVING AVAILABLE RESOURCES:

To remain competitive and viable as a club in the long term we will continue to increase the funds available to support the club, strengthening its playing and coaching resources and to continue to improve the facilities available to the players. While the revenue has grown there is also a need to further diversify the sources of funding and reduce the reliance on a few key sponsors and events.

At present while the club has performed to a high standard in the NSW Premier Cricket competition, its grounds continue to be ranked towards the bottom of the ladder. The club is encouraged by the Masterplan for Chatswood Oval and planned improvements to the playing surface of Beauchamp Oval, but the development of a long-term plan to resolve the quality of grounds, further improve facilities and secure long-term tenancies is a high priority.

Coaching support has contributed to improved performances on field but there is always a need to further develop the coaching structure and identify qualified coaching resources. This will be given attention in the coming period.

2: EXPANDING THE CRICKET COMMUNITY

For the club to grow and develop it needs to increase its interactions with and influence within the broader communities within which it operates. This mainly applies to Cricket NSW, Councils, Women's and Junior Clubs, and Volunteers.

Key pillars of the Cricket NSW strategy are to grow investment in the game; to increase participation substantially and; inspire the next generation of players and fans. They are looking to ensure the stability and strength of the NSW Premier Clubs and provide support when needed. They have recently undertaken a review of the health of each club. We will enlist their support to identify and implement best practice in all areas of the running of a Premier club and support with developing infrastructure, identification of resources and interaction with Councils. The club will work with all levels of Council to understand their constraints and position the club as an important contributor to the recreational needs of the broader community.

The club has good relationships with the Women's and Junior clubs and opportunities to support their development will be identified in addition to further building on existing relationships with key schools to grow the club's community involvement.

The running of the club is entirely dependent on enthusiastic volunteers. In addition to the constant need for more support, succession management will be addressed to ensure smooth transitions as volunteers move on.

C: STRENGTHENING COMMUNICATIONS, LEVERAGING DEVELOPING TECHNOLOGY

In recent years the club has successfully developed its communications vehicles, capitalising on new developments in supporting technology, with limited resources. As the technology continues to develop, pressure is exerted for more comprehensive and real time updates for, example real time scoring, videos and as has been seen elsewhere, live coverage. The club will continue this focus, while seeking to grow the number of contributors for content and administration.

D: ATTRACTING, RETAINING, AND DEVELOPING PLAYERS

The club has seen an improvement in playing performances and to continue this, attention to maintaining and improving our playing roster and developing players will be given significant attention.

Operations Report

CHATSWOOD OVAL

As with previous seasons, those rugby chaps didn't make life easy for the groundsmen in getting the oval into top notch shape for First grade. Plenty of bare patches and an uneven cover of grass typified the early rounds. However, as the season progressed, so did the outfield and come the start of the New Year, Chatty Oval was looking as good as I'd ever seen it. The decks being produced also had a lot more grass covering which helped all bowlers. Underneath of course remained the rock solid traditional Chatswood road so it was a case of getting early wickets before it flattened out.

We had the new black sight screens installed which has made a huge difference in the ease of setting them up and pulling them down again. With PG's also playing with a white ball, this was particularly good timing. The new practice decks were generally well received but again, we must find a solution to changing the net boxes over as required because they're just damn heavy and difficult to manage. Perhaps a small hand operated fork lift may be an answer.

Council will be undertaking some fairly big renovations to Chatswood oval in the near future with one of the grandstands being demolished as well as our practice gear storage shed so space is going to be at a premium. They will also be installing shade cloth over a lot of the southern end seating and creating a dedicated walking track around part of the outside of the oval.

Many thanks to our groundsmen Glenn and Matt for their great help throughout the season and to everyone who lent a hand to set up our practice days (take a bow Trevor).

KILLARA PARK

The beginning of the season saw a decent covering of grass on Killara Oval (unlike previous seasons) mainly due to a relatively dry winter and hence, not as much damaged created by soccer players. The major problem with Killara is a lack of irrigation so it's always reliant on decent rainfall to keep the grass healthy which, of course, generally comes on Fridays and Saturdays! There's no point in banging on about the damage the dogs and rabbits cause as that clearly isn't going to change. Killara Pavilion continues to get older with no scheduled upgrades in the pipeline despite many requests to Ku-ring-gai Council. It's actually still a pleasant spot to play cricket at but desperately need some TLC. The wickets prepared were of varying quality with inconsistent bounce on week to week basis but I guess it was the same for both teams. The groundsman's time is spread over a few ovals so work on Killara is never scheduled until Thursdays.

CASTLE COVE OVAL

Once again this season, we had a disrupted year and in need of a new ground to play on due to renovations being carried out on Beauchamp Park. The work carried out by council should see Beauchamp become a much improved cricket oval with a new covering of couch grass, irrigation and draining improvements being completed. Hopefully the rugby season doesn't undo all the good work. As a consequence, Willoughby Council allocated Castle Cove Oval for our use during the season – a picturesque suburban ground but one with very limited facilities – no kitchen, umpires room and very small change rooms proved challenging but all the boys that played there made the most of it and there was certainly no complaints about the location. Unfortunately, the natural slope of the ground

meant there were times during consistent rain where the water got in under the covers and resulted in a few abandoned days play when we would have definitely played on Beauchamp.

All in all, it wasn't a successful stint especially given the company contracted by Council of preparing it in insufficient hours. A welcome return to Beauchamp next season is anticipated.

TRAINING

One of our club's problems is finding regular synthetic wickets to train on when bad weather wipes out the decks at Chatswood. With the ever growing popularity of women's cricket and the usual large numbers of junior cricketers, with no new grounds to accommodate the ever expanding numbers, this is a situation that won't be solved easily. We are fortunate to be able to use Shore school practice wickets on a regular basis but other options are virtually non-existent. It's impossible to make a regular booking somewhere when we only need to train on synthetic due to weather.

CLOTHING

Another year of Beastwear clothing has concluded and on the whole, I think the clothing was pretty decent. Not everyone can be satisfied with the gear of course but, as long as it's durable, looks good and is reasonably cool to wear during the summer months, that's more than half the battle. GDCC has signed a new 3 year deal with Beastwear and Matt Wright has been busy designing the new look for 2019/2020. Thanks heaps Matty.

First grade numbered 'baggy' caps were introduced last season and players looked great out in the field. This will be the start of a great Stag's tradition. Thanks to the honourable Michael Falk for all the hard work he did in compiling the Club player numbers from 1905. Looking forward to another season of madness on and off the field Up the Stags!

First Grade Report

The final standings show Gordon in tenth position and three points outside of the finals. Losses in each of the last three games proved particularly costly but a very slow start to the year, with two draws and two losses from the opening four games, was just as expensive. Overall, our final standing is a fair

The highlight of the season was the side's performance in the limited overs competition where we qualified in third position and won a very dramatic quarter-final against UNSW. Unfortunately Sydney University were too strong in the semi-final.

The quarter final was a match defined by some excellent batting by both sides' opening pairs, two very dramatic batting collapses and a match winning rear guard action. UNSW lost their last eight wickets for 39 runs (2 for 198 to all out for 237) and Gordon lost six wickets for seven runs to move from 2 for 131 to 8 for 138. Fortunately Glenn Winsor (60) and Charlie Stobo (39*) came together for a fantastic partnership to see us home in the penultimate over. This was one of the most memorable wins I have been a part of at Gordon and showed the batting ability of both Glenn and Charlie.

After making the move to Sydney from Singleton, Glenn's first season with Gordon was impressive and highlights included his game winning innings against UNSW and the incredible figures of 5/9 against Hawkesbury. At eighteen years old, Glenn has a bright future at the Stags and should be an excellent cricketer for some time.

Our success in the limited overs competition was in no small part down to the bowling efforts of Scott O'Brien who did an outstanding job through the middle and final overs of these games. Scott was a constant wicket taking threat and his performances in limited overs games included figures of 3/36 against Easts, 3/7 against St George and 4/42 against UNSW.

Max Newman was very good all season behind the stumps with a total of 37 dismissals and some very handy batting contributions down the order. Max's quick half century in the limited overs semi-final ensured we finished with a competitive total and kept us in the game.

There were also some excellent individual performances from Axel Cahlin, who scored three centuries in the first five matches and was rewarded with selection in the NSW Futures League side. Ax showcased his supreme technique and timing during these innings and at 21 years old already has seven centuries in the top grade. Unfortunately Ax struggled to recreate this form for the remainder of the season but there is no doubt he will be back next year as one of the top run scorers in the competition.

Second Grade Report

Season 2018/19 was disappointing yet promising for 2nd grade. Carrying one of the younger (if not youngest) side in the competition was always going to be a challenge as the season progressed. A lack of consistency was also instrumental to 2nd grade's struggles this season. Whether it was batting, bowling or fielding, the side showed sessions of brilliance and sessions that made everybody wonder why this side were anywhere near 2nd grade level. Despite the lack of consistency, I am confident that many if not all of the players that participated in the 2nd grade season have the potential to go on to play 1st grade cricket at Gordon.

As with any season, there were standout performances from several players.

Lachlan Barnsley arrived this year from Lismore and immediately had an impact on matches he was involved in. The talented, young batsman was fantastic early in the season. Batting in the top three, he showed the rest of the players how an innings should be built. Lachlan ended up with 423 runs in his 10 innings in 2nd grade at an average of 52.88.

2nd grade stalwart Dom Thomson was an ever-reliable opening batsman for the team throughout the season. Not for the first time, Dom showed what an asset he can be with his cagey, yet effective batting style. Along with his batting, Dom was excellent in the field, always ensuring that players are up with the play and switched on. Dom finished the season with 417 runs from 12 digs at an average of 37.91.

Another player who is not shy of a 2nd grade appearance is Dan Stickland. Dan had an excellent year with the ball, leading the bowling group throughout the season. With his highergrade experience, it was important for the side that Dan stepped up to lead the bowlers this season – a job he took on with ease and enthusiasm. Dan finished the season with 28

wickets @ 23.39 from 14 matches. This included two 5 wicket performances with his best bowling coming against Fairfield-Liverpool (7/32).

Ashwin Premkumar is another newcomer who immediately announced his arrival. Using his height and natural out swinging delivery, he quickly became a strike bowler for the 2nd grade side. Ashwin finished the season with 19 wickets @ 19.89 from just 11 games. This included best bowling figures of 5 for 23. Matt Wright was also impressive as an all-rounder in the side. Matt was required to bowl and bat at difficult times throughout the season, never complaining and never using excuses if things did not go well. Being one of the younger players in the side, his

mindset and attitude is beyond his years and I suspect that there are exciting things to come from this young all-rounder. Matt finished the season with 17 wickets and 206 runs @ 30 from just 10 innings.

Third Grade Report

Fourth Grade Report

The ladder after 4 rounds was not a promising sight, as 4th grade fell to equal 17th on just 7 points with 1 win and 1 draw. That said, there were promising elements with Hamblin notching up 97 against Blacktown, Bromley 57 against UNSW and Will Calov with a match winning 4/28 in the same

match.

Not feeling comfortable languishing at the bottom of the table and disappointed by losses against sides Gordon would expect to handle comfortably, the team seemingly flicked a switch in Round 5 and strung together 9 wins from the remaining 11 matches, including the scalps of some of the strongest teams in the competition, Penrith, Eastern Suburbs, Manly and Sydney Uni.

Of particular mention is the fighting spirit shown throughout the season, which saw more last over or last wicket wins than you'd expect to see across three seasons of cricket. Chauhan and Calov scored the winning runs in the last over against UNSW, while it

In other years these matches could go against you and bring a completely different position on the ladder, but this year we were on the right side of many extremely close matches.

Many of the contests were tight and highly entertaining, but one of the best results was one which saw the team jump into the top 4. It was a match against Fairfield, with 120 overs to be bowled in the day after missing the first week. Knowing something special was required to lock in a place in the finals, there was an added focus in the team against a side low on confidence. The first innings saw Fairfield all out for a score of 106. Knowing this was an opportunity to capitalize, Gordon chased down the total 5 down and declared right away, with 56 overs left in the day. Fairfield managed just 69 in their second innings where the bowlers dominated, particularly Hood with 2/8 off 7 and Chauhan 4/23 off 5. This left 21 overs for Gordon's batsman to take the outright victory which, guided by top scorers Kleem, Jayasekera and Spratt was done in just 12 overs.

In looking at the standout individual achievements of 4 wickets or scores above 50 throughout the year, Hamblin 97 and Andreou 54 against Blacktown, Calov 4/28 and Bromley 57 against UNSW, McElduff 103 and Bromley 53 against Penrith, Bromley 116 and Chauhan 106 against Campbelltown with Khetarpaul 5/27, Burrows 4/39 & Kleem 119 against Randwick Petersham, Spratt 52 against Eastern Suburbs, Hood 5/43 and Hamblin 62 against St George, Chauhan 4/23 against Manly, Chauhan 4/15 and 62 with Hamblin 68 against Sydney Uni, Chauhan 4/23 against Fairfield, Jayasekera finished the last of the notable performances with 93 against Sutherland. While the above were outstanding achievements, many 2 and 3

wicket hauls with low runs for the likes of Seneviratne, Phoonie, Fletcher, Niranjan, Fletcher and Hamblin shouldn't go without mention. Nor should batting from consistently solid contributors Andreou, Niranjan, Fletcher and Wilson.

Unfortunately, after such a tough struggle to make the finals, the season was ended due to rain in the quarter final. While St George were very much on the ropes at 9/169 at Hurstville Oval, it wasn't to be with the Stags not making it onto the pitch on Day 2. While it was a disappointing way to end a season, it was one where the team showed real fight to claw its way back from yet another terrible start to take big scalps and win knife edge matches. It was a third straight year of finals cricket and as a unit the team had the belief of being able to go all the way, but it does show the importance of finishing as high as possible on the ladder.

Fifth Grade Report

After a strong season in 2017/18 where we won the minor premiership but faulted in the semi-finals the primary goal this season was to strive for the Sherwood Cup once again.

As has been the case in recent years the makeup of the 5th grade squad was very different with only 3-4 players from last year's semi-final matches present in the early rounds. Some players had progressed to higher grades and others were no longer playing for the club. Success

Poidevin Gray Shield Report

The 2018/19 Poidevin Gray Shield season saw the majority of last season's playing group return with the injection of some fresh country talent. Under the guidance of 1st Grade's Tym Crawford and club coaches Ben Preece and Trevor Chappell, a promising season loomed for the young Stags. For the second consecutive year, four T20 matches were included in the fixtures, a familiar yet tough challenge that the young Stags enjoyed. Again, there were several fantastic performances shared among the playing group which is a credit to the talent and depth of the squad. They should be commended for their positive attitude and professionalism throughout the season.

Round one saw the Stags face Penrith in what should have been a home fixture, however inclement weather in the preceding days meant that Chatswood Oval was closed for the weekend forcing the match to be played at Cook Park. Despite overcast conditions the outfield was in good condition and the wicket was dry but tacky. Making first use of the ball, the Stags struggled to break the opening partnership until an excellent spell of leg spin from Daniel Chillingworth, who bowled with outstanding flight and variation took the first wicket with the score on 93. Vikrant Nehru (1/22 from 3 overs) accompanied Daniel (3/30 from 4 overs) as the only other wicket taker for the day and the Stags managed to peg Penrith back to 6/150 after 20 overs which was a great effort in tough conditions. The run chase started poorly with wickets lost in regular intervals. A middle order fightback from the country lads Josh Staines (22) and Ryan Meppem (18) was not enough as the Stags were bowled out for 133.

Eager to make amends from the sub-par performance in round one the stags found themselves at the beautiful manly oval on what was another wet and overcast day. The outfield was soggy in patches adjacent to the square however the wicket was dry and flat. Manly won the toss and the elected to bat however overseas recruit Jack Plom handed Gordon the early advantage, capturing a wicket in his first over, bowling with good pace and bounce. A large 2nd wicket partnership of 84 brought Manly back into the game however the run rate was still under control.

An excellent performance with ball from spinner Matt Wright (3/33 from 4 overs) gave the stags momentum throughout the middle of the innings. He bowled with

fantastic pace variation and control while efforts from Ryan Meppem (2/12 from 3 overs) and Ash Premkumar (1/26 from 4 overs) restricted Manly to 7/131 from their 20 overs. Axel Cahlin and Jamie Bekis were off to rapid start until Axel was dismissed for 25. The loss of 3 wickets for 1 run put the stags under a lot of pressure to resurrect the chase however fresh country recruits Lachlan Barnsley and Glen Winsor demonstrated their skill with calculated hitting strike rotation. Unphased by the required run rate they took the score to 126 before Lachlan was dismissed for 43 by what could only be described as a "freakish" catch. Josh Staines and Glen (46*) held their nerve to see the stags home on the very last ball of the innings which was smashed to the boundary, notching up the first win of the season.

The celebrations were short lived with the next match commencing within an hour or so at the nearby Bon Andrews Oval against arch rivals north Sydney. Some logistical difficulties delayed the match by half an hour however no time was lost, and the stags elected to bat on a dry, hard wicket that appeared likely to deteriorate. Utilising the short boundary, some strong hitting from PG's veterans Jamie Bekis (31 from 25 balls) and Michael Roberts (67 from 46 balls) laid an excellent platform for the innings. Lachlan continued his fine form from earlier in the day with a quick fire 35 from 22 balls at the back end of the innings as the stags reached 160 at the end of their 20 overs.

With the wicket only getting lower and slower, accurate stump to stump bowling from our quicks Jack (1/17 from 3 overs), Glen (2/24 from 4 overs) Ash (1/37 from 4 overs) and Ollie Sutton (2/31 from 4 overs) saw wickets fall at regular intervals. A powerful innings from one of their middle order batsman gave North Sydney a glimmer of hope but spin twins Ryan and Matt supported the quicks bowling adeptly to the long boundary in what was a solid allround performance, handing the stags their second win

of the day.

On the back of two outstanding wins, the young stags were finally back at their stomping ground, hosting Campbelltown in what was the final T20 fixture. The visitors elected to bat first on a hard wicket that showed signs of wear from the previous days play and short boundaries square of the wicket were sure to provide a tough task for the bowling unit. A sharp run out drew first blood however the short boundaries and a stand out innings from one of their top order batsman, who was striking over 200 allowed them to accelerate the score rapidly. Once again Matt Wright displayed his skill consistency in the shorter formats, a testament to his work ethic and was rewarded as such, taking 2/25 from 4 overs including the dangerous batsman.

He was supported well by Ryan (2 for 25 from 3 overs) and Jack (2/22 from 4 overs) while leg spinner Daniel added another wicket to his tally from 3 overs thanks to his aggressive turn. Campbelltown finished on 8/151 however a well-structured chase would be required from the stags with batting conditions becoming increasingly difficult. The loss of openers Axel and Jack early put the stags on the back foot and they struggled to wrestle back any momentum. Michael fought hard for a well-made 31 and despite some decent bowling from the opposition, soft dismissals around him at regular intervals saw innings finish at 9/111 after 20 overs.

With Gordon sitting just outside of the top eight after the T20's, the side knew how important strong performances in the one-day matches would be if they were to progress to the finals again. With Axel away for the first match in this format, stand in Skipper Jamie led the side at Rosedale against a dangerous Fairfield outfit. He elected to bat on a good wicket, hoping the stags could set a big total to defend however the large boundaries meant that that application, hard running and shot placement was crucial in obtaining a good score. The innings did not start as planned with Jamie and his new opening partner Ryan Tulia dismissed before the score reached 20 however this allowed Lachlan and Glen to once again combine for a formidable partnership. Hard running and clean ball striking saw the pair add 75 before Glen was dismissed for a powerful 44 in which more than half of his runs came from boundaries. Lachlan was dismissed soon after for a classy 47 taking the score to 5/125 which left

the game in the balance. Solid contributions from our lower order batsmen Jack (31) and Daniel (20) enabled the stags to manage 213 from just under the allotted 50 overs.

The Stags' bowling unit had their work cut out for them however confidence and positivity was high. The pace cartel bowled a consistent line and length outside the off stump, a tactic which was discussed, and it paid dividedness with the Fairfield run rate contained while wickets fell at regular intervals. Ash was the pick of the bowlers taking 3/33 off his 10 overs which included 3 maidens, illustrating his relentless bounce and accuracy. Ryan spun his way to another 2 wickets and despite a tail end fight back, the game was always in control as the stags notched up an important win, bundling the opposition out for 162 in just 42 overs.

The penultimate round saw the stags face a strong Parramatta outfit at Old Kings Oval on what was a glorious day. The wicket is notoriously flat however can play quite slow. Parramatta won the toss and elected bat. Ollie swung the ball early and claimed the first scalp however Parramatta were able to build a partnership with posing a significant threat. Glen's late swing proved a tough task for the opposition as he claimed 3 wickets from his 10 overs however, they managed to keep the score ticking

over. Fellow pace bowlers Ash and Jack chimed in with a wicket each while the Spin assets of Matt and Ryan proved invaluable on the slow wicket, taking 2 and 1 wickets respectively. Parramatta eventually reached 205 from their 50 overs however the stags remained in control of the run rate, giving themselves a good opportunity of a successful chase.

Unfortunately, our approach to the chase was not managed and as a batting unit, poor decisions were made on a regular basis. Soft dismissals gave Parramatta the upper hand and patient knocks from Josh (34) and Ryan (42) were not enough to mend the earlier collapse. We were dismissed for

With one round to play and a congested ladder, a victory was necessary to ensure a spot in the finals. Gordon faced wests at Chatswood oval which was in fine condition post-Christmas. With the game played on a previously used wicket, the stags elected to bat first giving themselves the best opportunity to set a big total. Ryan Tulia combined with Axel at the top however the former fell early with the new ball swinging. Lachlan joined Axel before the skipper was dismissed for a run a ball 41. Starts were

made by most batsmen however no one was able to convert it to a big score, which was a noticeable theme throughout the season although healthy contributions from veteran Michael (42) and country lads Josh and Ryan (24 and 20 respectively) enabled Gordon to reach 191 in 47 overs. A disappointing batting performance however the side was confident of producing a winning performance in which they did. The young stags displayed just how good they can be when all cylinders are firing as they accounted for wests in only 35 overs. Ash, Glen and Ollie combined their fiery pace with excellent execution of individual plans taking 3 wickets between themselves. A special mention must go to ash who had an economy rate of less than one run per over! From here spinners Matt and Ryan controlled the middle of the innings, mixing up their pace and flights to deceive the opposing batsmen. Ryan only conceded 10 runs from his 6 overs while Matt proved his worth yet again taking a staggering 4/9 from just 5 overs with calculated plans and pace variances. Wests were bowled out for 80 and a bonus point was obtained as the exuberant stags headed into the finals!

In a rematch of last year's grand final, we faced Penrith at Howell oval on a lovely but rather warm day. The side was keen to exact revenge from the events of last season as well as round one earlier in the year. Penrith won the toss and elected to bat on a hard, dry wicket that was likely to break up as the game progressed. A formidable opening partnership of 91 gave Penrith the early advantage and the stags needed an injection of energy to get themselves back in the game. We tightened the screws in the field and used our spinners to great effect, restricting the run rate and applying pressure. Ryan and Matt once again combined with their excellent flight control, being rewarded with figures of 4/24 from 10 overs and 3/23 from 10 overs respectively. The pair had brought the game back into our control as

we restricted Penrith to 9/172 after 50 overs. An outstanding effort considering our start. The pitch had eroded, and batting conditions were tough as the Stags looked to chase down Penrith's score.

Defensive fields and tight bowling made scoring difficult as pressure took its toll on the stags. In efforts to accelerate the run rate wickets were lost which had the stags reeling. Contributions from Ryan Tulia (22), Glen (22) and Ryan Mapped (31) were not enough and the Stags were defeated by 46 runs with 10 overs remaining. A disappointing finish to the season as hindsight suggests there was a lot more time than what we had thought however it was a fantastic effort to once again make the finals.

In our 37th season we put EIGHT teams on the park for the first time by adding a third Sixers team, as well as participating in the inaugural NSW Women's Premier Cricket U15 Pilot Competition.

Secretary's Report

Season 2018-19 has been a very successful one for the Mighty Reds. Two years after our last Club Championship, we have achieved it again with significant contributions from all participating Premier Cricket teams. The season also featured premierships to the Combined T20 Blue, Third Grade Limited Overs, U15 Premier, U13 Spring / Summer and U17 Spring teams.

We are proud of our on-field success and how we are truly one Club, but just as equally, it cannot be disputed that we are also one of the most (if not most) committed Clubs in upholding and actively promoting the values of the "Spirit of the Game".



The Teams

First Grade had an interrupted Limited Overs competition with wet weather and byes playing havoc with playing regular cricket. In the end, it was extremely disappointing when the Grand Final match versus Campbelltown-Camden was washed out, as the team was primed for a big match. Across the team though, there were many significant contributors including Saskia Horley who continued her impressive form with both bat and ball. Also noteworthy was Charlotte Anneveld's domination of Northern District in a match with figures of 5/6 off 10 overs! Captain Hannah Trollip post the Grand Final, announced that she would be stepping away from cricket. Hannah had captained the team for the past nine seasons and has done an outstanding job in that time as well being a consistent performer. She has established a great platform for the team's continued success.

The Club decided to enter two teams this season in the Combined (First and Second Grade) T20 competition to ensure players were receiving as much cricket opportunities as possible. The Blue team which was largely the First Grade team went through the competition as undefeated Premiers, which is a fabulous achievement. Again, Saskia Horley was impressive in this competition with great returns also by all-rounder Charlotte Anneveld, keeper-batter Heidi Cheadle, and bowlers Bella Fitzgibbon and Liz Mair. The Red team gained some valuable learning opportunities playing against First Grade teams in the T20 format which they brought back to the Limited Overs competition.

Second Grade received a new leadership and management team and the next generation of young players to step up to Grade cricket. The team made the Limited Overs semi-finals which was a great result and turn-around after recent seasons. Captain Jessie Maclaine put in significant work in bringing the team together, preparing for matches and is undoubtedly highly respected by all members of the team. The team's strength was bowling and fielding and many impressive performances saw the team defend, at times, some modest batting totals. Next season promises for the team to hopefully go one step further.

Third Grade had a number of team leaders (due to varying numbers!) but a big highlight was claiming the Limited Overs premiership for the first time in 10 years after finishing the rounds as Minor Premiers. A stormy day at Yagoona saw the grand final declared a draw much to the frustration of the drenched opposition! The team also finished as runners-up in the T20 competition. Kristen Dorsch had an excellent all-round season with Jane Warrilow, Lisa Chan and Liz Arruzza also claiming a lot of wickets. We look forward to the team having another great season.

In the Brewer Shield (U17) competition, the team had another great season on the back of last season's premierships and were well led by Sophie Martland. The team unfortunately lost to Parramatta in the semi-final, but the players can hold their heads high for the manner in which they approach their cricket at all times. There were a number of outstanding performers including but not limited to Lauren Kua, Charlotte Camburn (featuring a 100 retired not out), Kinjal Kumari and Anna Wilson-Brown (including a 5/23).

This season, the SCAWC introduced a six-week pilot competition for U15 girls to experience playing on turf in Premier Cricket. Gordon entered a young team and played some great cricket to finish as eventual Premiers as the highest placed team. The girls had a great experience (coupled with the U15 tournament at Orange) and it is understood that this competition is likely to be introduced as a permanent and expanded fixture for next season.

In the Sixers Girls Cricket League, Gordon entered three teams in the Spring competition (U13, U15 and U17) and three teams (U13 and two U17) in the Summer competition. The U13 Spring / Summer and U17 Spring teams attained premierships. It was fantastic to see the significant growth in the junior ranks even mid-season. Well done to Junior Coordinator, Alan Gibbons for all his work in organising the team entries. The continuing development of the junior section of the Club is brilliant.

2019 brought a renewed energy and hunger to the 2nd grade side. What a privilege to be part of the inaugural U15 competition this year, a 6-round, 35-overs-per-innings competition played on turf for girls aged 12-15.

This competition was formed in recognition of the growth in women's cricket, to align to the national U15/U18/grade structure and to give young players the opportunity to play premium-level cricket. While only a 6-week trial in 2019, it is hoped that this will form an ongoing fixture in club cricket from the 2019-20 season onwards in much the same way as the Brewer Shield for U18s.

OUR TEAM

We had an incredible set of players with amazing talent available to play for Gordon, many players having played reps level cricket and almost our whole team having played on turf for 4 days in a row in the tournament in Orange earlier this year. This included four wonderful players who joined us from Lane Cove club - Olivia Callaghan, Lucy Yates, Lily Dorahy and Maddie Caspers.

Our captain, Amy Gibbons, brought her experience of 4 years of representative cricket to the team and was ably supported by vice-captains Felicity Stewart, Lizzie Cambridge and Charlie Hill. Amy actually received compliments from umpires on her captaincy during the season, a great testament to her and her leadership team.

Gordon club has built real strength and depth through deep investment in our players (Gordon Academy, pre-season training, Orange Western Junior Cricket Carnival, Sixers League and plenty of coaching and training) and we were able to call on a squad of 17 players in total, ranging from players in NSW Academy through to younger players who will still be eligible for this age group for another 3 years! In addition to those mentioned, the squad included Taara Kotibhaskar, Julia O'Mara, Sophie Fanning, Isha Peshave, Sapphire Wildie, Bronte Howse, Olivia Castanheira, Hayley Yeomans and Wynter O'Regan.

OUR TEAM'S PHILOSOPHY

The competition is based on the Brewers format, which is more competitive in nature than the participative philosophy in the Sixers leagues, a reflection of more senior cricket that some of our

players will venture into in the not-too-distant future. Our intention from the outset was that we were playing hard and competitively with the goal of winning the competition. That meant we would follow our Brewer's team's approach and select the batting and bowling line ups with a consistent core, a set of 4 or 5 players who were well suited to opening at representative level, and who would form the foundation for us in every match. We would then mix and rotate players after that in such a way to give as many players a go while maintaining our competitive intent and balancing player interests as far as possible — we know, for example, that not everyone was comfortable batting higher up the order, yet occasionally we pushed players into slightly uncomfortable roles as part of their development. We can't and didn't always get it right, but there were plenty of long conversations as we worked really hard to achieve this balance.

We also set ourselves a very strong code of **Dignity, Pride and Respect** – we would play cricket the way it was designed to be played as per the Preamble written into the rules themselves. We would hold our heads high - win or lose, hat tricks or ducks; we would be proud of our team, our club, ourselves and the sport we have chosen to love, and we would respect our opponents, the officials and the game itself. We banned sledging, we wore the right uniforms, we thanked umpires and opponents sincerely with handshakes, smiles and confident eye contact and we re-introduced an old tradition from my days as a young cricketer in South Africa: we welcomed new batters to the crease with a round of applause rather than some tired old sledge.

All of this combined for a fantastic season for us where we won matches, yes, but we also won the hearts and minds of parents, officials and opponents alike. A key highlight for us was the number of compliments we received from umpires after the match on our approach, our energy and our talent, all attributes we can be truly proud of as a winning team.

THE MATCHES

Round 1: Mosman at the Allan Border Oval – Mosman 45 all out; Gordon 81 all out. Key performances: Felicity 3/6, Lucy 2/12; Lucy 16, Taara 12

What a privilege to play at the Allan Border Oval – a beautiful setting in Mosman with perfect ground conditions and excellent facilities. Some of our first graders even expressed their envy of our young team having the opportunity to play here!

We came out with our intention of winning very clear – our bowling was sharp, and our fielding was absolutely incredible. Mosman were under constant pressure throughout and were simply not given a chance to steal a run or find a gap. The wickets kept tumbling and Mosman were all out in just 14 overs, hardly giving us a chance to rotate our bowlers through – we did manage to use 7 bowlers which we knew would help build depth for later in the season.

Our batting was unfortunately really disappointing. The competition awards bonus points for scores of up to 100 runs higher than the opposition (and for all wickets taken by the bowling team, giving both teams something to play for), so our actual target was 146 – we only managed 81 and only batted for 21 of our 35 overs. This was a great lesson for us in how to build our innings in a match format that is so vastly different from the T20 matches we are used to. We spent a lot of time working on patience and shot selection at training, ready for match 2.

Round 2: Northern District Blue at Balmoral Oval – Gordon 6/121; ND 58 all out Key performances: Olivia 32*, Lily 19, Lizzie 18; Sapphire 3/9, Bronte 2/5, Amy 2 catches and a run out

Much better!

Olivia Callaghan anchored the innings for us with a patient 32* (mandatory retirement at 30 runs) and many other players took the time to play themselves in. Our goal was to bat for the full 35 overs which we did, and 7 of our players scored 7 runs or more — Lily and Lizzie both batting beautifully with a good mix of patience and aggression. This was a much more focused and determined effort, with far better shot selection and the discipline to leave and defend the right deliveries and play more straight bat shots.

Our bowling and fielding were pinpoint accurate again. Sapphire was rewarded with 3 wickets for her excellent pace, line and especially length and Bronte bowled superbly for her 2 wickets. We bowled 8 players in this match including Amy having a go with her left arm spin and picking up 1/1 in 2 overs. We were exceptionally good in the field again – Amy taking 2 catches behind the stumps and picking up a runout, and Maddie looking exceptionally good in the field with a catch and a run out.

We still hadn't full capitalized on our batting talent and we believed a 100-run victory for maximum points was within our grasp.

Round 3: Northern District Gold at Barker College – ND 71 all out, Gordon 3/173 Key performances: Taara 31*, Lucy 31*, Lizzie 31*; Lizzie 2/6; Charlie 2 catches, Felicity 2 run outs

Yes! We did it! Maximum points!

What a gorgeous field to play on again — Barker College's number 1 oval!

Our team was ready and fired up. We even arrived earlier than the opposition and removed the covers for them. Our warmup included Ted-ball and some touch footy, our spirits were high, and we were looking forward to a really good game.

Amy won the toss and decided to put ND under pressure from the outset - they were immediately in trouble, losing their first 5 wickets for only 4 runs! We took the opportunity to bowl our full team ... 11 bowlers in total. It was really good to see Isha have a go and be keen for more, and to see Hayley and Wynter bowl well to pick up a wicket each. Our fielding was the best it had been all season, with 2 great catches by Charlie and a deadly accurate fast-bowlers arm from Felicity getting 2 direct hit runouts.

With plenty more chatting about patience and shot selection, our batters did themselves really proud after some hard work at training and lessons learnt in the first two matches. Three of them retired on 31^* – Taara, Lucy and Lizzie all demonstrating patience and taking plenty of singles on offer. We reached the target of 173 with a further 7 overs remaining – a really strong 100-run victory, well played and well deserved.

Round 4: Manly at Graham Reserve – Manly 53 all out, Gordon 6/133 Key performances: Lizzie 3/10, Maddie 2/3, Wynter 2 overs 0 runs!; Lucy 31*, Olivia 27, Amy 17 *(15)

Everyone loves playing at Manly – great ground, always a fantastic lunch and super-friendly opposition. Big shout out to Manly for consistently raising the bar on hosting teams there. Amy won the toss again and stayed with last week's winning formula, asking Manly to bat first. Excellent bowling again meant that wickets kept falling for Manly, with no player able to score double figures. Lizzie's spin bowling was pinpoint accurate, finding some rough patches and being incredibly difficult to play. Maddie too showed what taking some pace off the ball can do as she bowled beautifully for her 2/3, and it was really good to see Wynter get control in her bowling and bowl 2 maidens back to back.

Our batting was very solid on a tricky wicket, with great patience shown by Lucy (31 from 66 balls) and from Lizzie (13 from 30). Amy decided to bat herself down the order to give others a go, coming in at number 11 and showing what power hitting is all about, blasting 3 fours as she raced to 17 off 15 in the successful chase for an extra 2 bonus points for the team.

Round 5: Universities at Chatswood Oval - rained out

Many of our players (and coaches, to be fair) were really looking forward to meeting an Australia hero in the form of Alex Blackwell, coach of the Universities team. Unfortunately, despite valiant efforts from parents with covers, Chatswood and our backup ground Warrimoo were both swimming pools and there was no play possible (in fact, not a single match was played anywhere in Sydney).

Round 6: St George Sutherland at Olds Park – following an SCA ruling, match declared a tie Key performances: Lizzie 2/23, Wynter/Julia/Isha/Amy all getting a wicket; Amy 27, Lucy 15

The beautiful Olds Park ground was in great condition for our final match of the season. Both teams were unbeaten, and the winner would be champions. Gordon were ahead on the ladder with better performances through the season, thanks in large to those matches where we pushed hard for maximum bonus points.

Unfortunately, St George Sutherland (SGS) decided to play 2 ineligible players, much to our disappointment. The match was unbalanced and after we lodged a protest, the SCA found in our favour and made appropriate adjustments to the ladder.

However, cricket was still played, and there were still highlights, not least of which was that cricket was still played!

Amy win the toss again, chose to bowl first again, but this time it didn't go quite according to plan. SGS batted extremely well, with many of their players getting runs, including the two ineligible players putting on over 70 runs for the 6th wicket. We were also unlucky – one of those days when 50-50's just don't go your way – pop-up catches landing between fielders, that sort of thing.

It was brilliant to see our captains really thinking hard and trying different tactics to shake some wickets loose, with variations in fielding positions and bowling changes that would have made Meg Lanning proud. We bowled 11 bowlers again in this match and I felt a real rush of pride seeing Isha, Julia, Wynter and Amy getting wickets — a real team effort which symbolized the season of teamwork and unity for us.

We started out well in our batting, reaching 1/41 at one stage as Amy and Lucy batted magnificently together. Lucy eventually fell for 15 and then Amy for 27. We then lost wickets regularly, but I was very happy to see Sapphire and Bronte get some runs – very good for their development as players and setting us up for an exciting season in this competition in 2019-20.

Our victorious U15s from last season moved up to U17s this year for another fantastic T20 season. After some hard work during the Gordon academy our players were confident and full of smiles and excitement as we took to the field against Ravenswood for our first match.

T20 is designed to be fast and exciting and Cricket NSW have encouraged 'batting with positive intent', so we set ourselves a goal this season of increasing our strike rates and really taking the game to the opposition.

We were immediately in fine form, making 1/131 in our 20 overs including 17 fours and Libby's first six! We were even more on fire with the ball – Jillian grabbed 2/3, Flora 2/1 and Hayley picked up 2 wickets without conceding a single run! Our intention was clear: we were going to go hard this season and maximise every opportunity.

Game 2 was against Epping, a team we beat in last year's Spring competition and lost to by 1 run off the last ball in the grand final of the Summer Competition. We were really fired up for this one! Fantastic bowling from Jillian again with 2/4, Zoe with 2/6 and Phoebe 2/1, plus an absolutely amazing display of 4 catches in one match by Flora – all fielding at Point - meant we kept Epping to only 45 runs. We chased that down in only 10 overs thanks to Amy's rapid-fire 19 off 20 balls, including an enormous six that rattled the fence on the full.

Match 3 was up against our very own Deepti who had the honour of being named captain of her school team. Deepti managed to motivate Abbotsleigh to an incredible win against us despite our

team making a solid 4/111 (including Jothi's first ever six) and fast scoring from Flora (3 fours) and Libby (4 fours). Our bowling wasn't the best and it was a sobering loss for us and a reminder that victories have to be earned.

Next game we bounced back with a new record score: 2/163 off only 20 overs! Amy led the charge with 33 off 19 balls (5 of which were unplayable no-balls, she likes to remind me – so 33 off 14!), including 2 fours and 3 sixes! Libby also accelerated hard and made 31 off only 17 balls with 6 fours, and Felicity and Phoebe added 29 and 22 respectively. Some more fine bowling from Jillian 2/2 and Felicity 2/1 saw a very convincing victory for Gordon.

After a crushing defeat we expected Epping to come out all guns blazing – and they did! This time they put on 3/120 and we let the pressure get to us, falling well short at 5/86. Flora fought valiantly with 21 and some useful contributions from Zoe, Jyothi, Felicity and Phoebe (making 8 off only 2 balls!) just wasn't weren't enough on a day when Epping played really well.

With only 3 wins from 5 games and only 2 games to go, we had to dig deep if we wanted to win this season...So that's what we did!

Amy again led the charge, with her six onto and over Warrimoo clubhouse symbolic of how hard we fought back against Abbotsleigh after our loss to them earlier in the season. Amy made 33 off 20, Flora 20 off 25, Jyothi 16 off 17 and Phoebe 15 off only 11 as we made 4/130. Emma immediately set about dismantling their batting, with 2/6 and 2 catches being key to holding Abbotsleigh to only 97. A great win and a strong comeback.

We had to win our last game convincingly – we knew the ladder was very close and it would probably come down to net run rates to decide the champions.

Another strong batting performance by Amy with 29 off 25 (including 2 sixes), 28 off 18 from Emma (including 5 fours), 20 off 17 from Libby and 19 off 25 from Zoe saw us post another very strong score of 4/157. Emma then picked up 2/4, Hayley bowled superbly for only 3 runs from 3 overs and Amy picked up her 3rd stumping of the season, all contributing to a win for us by over 100 runs. Calculators came out and our very strong run rate meant we were champions – tied on 30 points with Epping, but a net run rate of 3.3 versus their 1.5 showed that our focus all season on scoring runs quickly really worked for us.

We had 3 players with strike rates over 100 for the season: Amy on 124, Libby 109, Emma 106 – fantastic aggressive batting – and 3 players with batting averages of over 50: Amy on 126, Flora on 86 and Felicity on 85. Amy managed to hit a record 7 sixes in the season; no other player in the competition hit more than 1. Libby topped the competition in the fours department, scoring 18 fours and a six from her 5 innings.

Jillian and Emma were our bowling superstars with averages of 3.6 runs per wicket taken; Hayley's 2/0 in a match was the 2nd best in the whole competition (behind Deepti's 3/7) and just ahead of Flora's 2/1, Phoebe's 2/1 and Felicity's 2/1. In the field Emma held 5 catches and Flora 4 (all in one match!), with Amy the only wicketkeeper in the competition to get a stumping (and she had 3!). A very strong all-round performance from all our players meant big smiles as we received medals on the North Sydney oval in front of the Big Bash crowd, for the second year in a row. Awesome!

And then there was the Summer season From season premiers in Spring to not winning a single match in Summer – wow! The U17 competition was restructured slightly for Summer, with matches being 25 overs rather than 20 (a very welcome change, giving our players more time out there) and the two strongest teams from U15s were promoted to U17. So, we had two Gordon

teams, plus Lindfield and Epping – a very strong competition for Summer and some super-exciting cricket!

For Summer we were renamed to "Gordon Blue", we lost Emma to Gordon Brewers (congrats Emma – opening bowler for U18s!) and Jyothi decided to take a break, but we gained Lucy Mitchell, Ciara Quinn and Emma Gore.

Our first match was an absolute disaster! Going from scores of 120-160 in Spring, we collapsed to 34 all out! Ouch! Lucy top scored for us, hitting her first ball for a six, and Libby looked solid for a while, but everyone else struggled. We showed a bit of fight, grabbing Epping's first 2 wickets with only 3 runs on the board, but it wasn't to be – a strong win for Epping this time.

Match 2 was against our other Gordon team, up from U15s in Spring. This was the first of many exciting matches and went right down to the wire. Lucy again top-scored for us with 13 and our import of the day from U13s, Zoe, looked very good for her 11*. Flora backed up with 10 and we reached 6/70 off our 25 overs. Jillian, Flora (3/10) and Hayley rattled through the top order and we had them on the ropes – Gordon Red only had about 50 and we needed one just more wicket. But Charlie and Alice dug deep and managed to keep out everything we could throw at them, ultimately passing our score in the 2nd-last over with still just that 1 wicket in hand.

Lindfield were up next ... we seldom get a tied score in cricket and 114-114 was incredibly exciting! Lindfield batted first and really piled on the runs. There was some good bowling from Bethany (3-2/4) and Libby (3-1/5), but some of our other bowlers experienced sixes being hit against us for the first time. Our batting then collapsed, with 6 of our players only putting on only 22 combined. However, Amy and Lucy came together and completely turned the game on its head – Amy hitting 32 off 35 (including 2 sixes) and Lucy 21 off 24 pushed the game to a very surprising tie (after considerable debate amongst scorers and umpires!)

Back against Epping for a rematch and this time we were much better. Tight bowling all round and we held Epping to 4/76, a score within our reach despite heavy rain at times and a match reduced to 20 overs. It was a game of very-very near chances that just didn't go our way ... Amy's near-six was instead held on the boundary by a player more surprised than us that she took the catch; Phoebe looked excellent for her 13 until she was very unlucky to be run out, Hayley had our team's 2nd-highest score of 9 including 2 magnificent fours through a very slow outfield, and 3 of our players were bowled by balls unusually keeping low on a very wet synthetic wicket. In the end we lost by only 12 runs – any number of 50-50 events going our way and the game would have been ours.

Our rematch against the Gordon Reds was even closer – only 6 runs in it this time. Gordon Red made 4/92, with good bowling for us from Flora (4-1/6), Zoe (1/14) and Amy (only 4 runs from 2 overs). Emma Ridley returned for a cameo match and starred with the bat, making 20* off 32, but our team batted too slowly, and the target stayed just out of reach, with us finishing on 3/86 off 25 overs. Another super-exciting game!

The semi-finals were against Epping – another close game of very good cricket. Good batting from Flora with 14 and Amy with 12, plus some very determined batting from Felicity facing 41 balls and Hayley facing 24 helped us along to 82. But despite good bowling from Amy (2/8), Libby (1/8), Hayley (1/10) and Phoebe (3-0/7), Epping just managed to outplay us on the day.

As you would expect, our season stats reflected our more challenging season, with everyone's stats significantly down from the Spring season. Amy topped the competition on strike rate again (73) and was our highest run scorer (55), with Emma (24) and Zoe (22) having our highest batting

averages. In bowling, Flora (5) and Libby (3) topped our wickets taken and Emma Gore had our team's best economy rate (2.14 runs per over). Our best catching came from Lucy (3), Flora (3) and Hayley (2), and Amy picked up one stumping for the season.

But stats don't tell the full story. Ours was a story of teamwork, rotation of players, development, equal participation for everyone and loving our cricket whether we won the competition (which we did) or didn't win a single match (which we did). Our U17s made us proud in every way possible, both on and off the field, and in their attitude as much as the performance.

It was once again my privilege to coach this fantastic team of players.
