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Message from the President

If one measures overall club performance purely by playing performances, Gordon had a relatively poor season. We slid to 12th on the club championship (from 8th the season before) and for the first time in several years we did not qualify for any grade or Metro Cup finals. In the end it was probably fortunate, given the season was cruelly cut short with the emerging impact of COVID-19. Our stand-out performance was our Poidevin-Gray side that played excellent cricket all season only to put in their only poor performance, being well beaten by UTS North Sydney, in the preliminary final of the competition.

There is no doubt we are in a re-building phase within the club, with four of our top six bats in 1st grade retiring in the past two seasons. The positive is we have some excellent

young players coming through and this has been shown by the performance of our Poidevin-Gray and Green Shield teams over the past few years. We need to nurture these players and if so, I have confidence they will become strong 1st grade players over the coming seasons.

One performance I am very proud of, is the winning of the Spirit of Cricket award for the third time. Club culture was an important focal point for the club last season and this message was embraced by our playing group. The award is voted on by the umpires based on player behaviour and it is a credit to all involved in the club that we have won this award. We can now use this as a foundation to develop our players and improve performance whilst remaining focused on playing the game in the right spirit, which to me is more important than merely winning cricket games at any cost.

Last year I decided that 2019/20 was to be my last as President of this great

club. However, given the situation we now find ourselves in with COVID-19, the impact this will have on our club next season and the lack of a logical successor, I have decided to put myself forward for one last season if the club wishes. I do feel it important to keep this role turning over as it is important to have the club continually re-invigorated with new ideas and enthusiasm.

Given where the world now finds itself (in May 2020, who knows what may happen in the coming months when you read this report), there will be some big challenges for both the Australian and global economies, sport including cricket and Gordon DCC. Our tireless executive committee has been focusing on this during the off season and by the time of the AGM we should be in a position to detail our position, outlook and response for season 2020/21.

I would like to spend the rest of my report focusing on the key contributors to our club as follows:

As mentioned above we have, last season lost three of our high quality first grade batsmen to retirement. I would like to personally thank Steve Colley, Cameron Eccles and Harry Evans for their immense contribution to the club on the field. They have shown loyalty, which seems uncommon these days, and genuine desire in helping the club perform to its highest levels. Harry and Steve have of course both captained our 1st Grade team and all will be sorely missed. My challenge to the three of them is to not walk completely away from Gordon and maybe after a small break, see what you can do to assist the club to continue moving forward.

Well-led by Lizzie Cambridge, the team learned plenty during their short season that was heavily impacted by rain then COVID and we hope you get to play much more cricket next season. COACHING & DEVELOPMENT

We welcomed Ben Preece as Head Coach. Ben is also the Head Coach of the Men's Division, so appointing him as our coach had the added benefit of bringing the men's and women's divisions closer together. Earning the nickname 'Sarge' very early in the preseason, Ben lifted our fitness, professionalism, and the structure of our training. Ben introduced multiple guest coaches during the season.

The Gordon Juniors at the SCG

Gordon Junior Cricket Club continued its growth during the 2019/20 season with an increase 25% in participating players. We had 409 players in total representing in excess of 30 teams aged between 6 and 17.

There was significant growth in the younger age groups which is pleasing to report and reflects that our game is prospering.

However, there was a drop off in numbers for the 13, 14- and 15-year old's and this is mainly due to the competition we have from the private schools who play on a Saturday in similar time slots. We also graded our 12- and 13-year old's for the first time with mixed success.

Both the under 12 and under 13 sides performed extremely well throughout the season and made semi-finals. The competitions were very strong and although we did not win a premiership the experience the players received will ensure future successes. Grading is something we have not done in the past as our Club focussed on participation and growth of the game in line with the Cricket Australia pathway program. We will continue to follow this pathway and in addition we will commit additional resources to our older players.

Apart from the competition of the schools we also noticed a slight drop off in the older ages as some players felt that they could not compete at a higher level. This is a most disturbing fact hence our commitment to add additional resources to the older ages - in particular coaching and different levels of competition to ensure we satisfy the needs of both aspiring cricketers and those who just want to have game with their friends.

This season we saw Woolworths return and sponsor the Junior Blaster and Master Blaster cricket programs which is the introduction to cricket for the very young (6,7, and 8-year old's). The

program was a real success and all the players enjoyed Saturday mornings at Gore Hill Oval decked out in their Gordon Colours.

We also had Junior Blaster programs on Friday evenings at Chatswood High and Willoughby Park which were a great success. We had 75 boys and girls participate in the young blaster programmes and a special thanks to Glen Kierse and Mark Fuzes for coordinating these sessions and also Gordon Junior players Chirag Patel and Tiger Khunmuang for coaching the young ones. Thanks also to Cassie Langford from Cricket NSW for inviting our junior blasters to star at the SCG during the New Year's test match.

Obituaries

ALLAN K POOLE (1951 – 2019)

Allan came to the Club as an outstanding schoolboy cricketer from Newington College. He was a member of the NSW Schoolboys team for two years (1969 &1970) and it didn't take him long to establish himself as a First Grader at Gordon. In his early years, he played during the school holidays and did exceptionally in Poidevin-Gray. As soon as he left school, he became a permanent member of the First-Grade team.

Allan's main strength was as a right arm medium fast bowler. He was very accurate and moved the ball around just enough to always be a threat. On a wicket that had a bit of moisture or life in it he was deadly. In First Grade, he took 139 wickets at an average of 22.22. His best season was in 1972-73, where he took 44 wickets at the excellent average of 16.09. That year, his skipper, Dick Guy wrote, "Alan Poole bowled magnificently... He had a wicket in either his first or second over on no less than ten occasions – what more

could you ask of an opening bowler. Add to this Alan's team spirit and he becomes an invaluable member of the side."

Allan always had a keen appreciation of the game. He captained many teams and everyone enjoyed playing with him and for him. He made sure his teams had a good time. In the 1974-75 season, Alan captained the Second-Grade side to the Minor Premiership, taking 60 wickets at 12.06 – a fantastic achievement. He shortened his run-up and bowled off breaks/cutters for the rest of his career – always accurate and doing enough to put pressure on the batsman. He took a further 43 wickets the following season, also a top performance. Allan played mostly Second Grade from then on although he could still contribute when called on in the top grade. In the 1980-81 season, he bowled the Firsts to a big victory against a strong Penrith team, taking 6-40 at Howell Oval. He kept playing Second Grade until the end of the 1987-88 season when he retired. He did come back in 1990-91 for a couple of games in 5th Grade and showed he'd lost little of his guile.

In all, Allan took 575 wickets for Gordon at the excellent average of 18.31. He ranks fifth in the Club's all-time wicket takers in all grades and second in the all-time Second Grade wicket takers with 434 wickets.

He was also a very hard-hitting batsman. At times it was frustrating in that he often was dismissed when perhaps going for runs too quickly. When he came off, he could do massive damage in a very short time. One such innings was at Marrickville Oval in a Second-Grade game against Petersham-Marrickville, where he came in with Gordon 6-166 and in some bother. Thirty-two minutes later he was dismissed – for 84, an incredible exhibition of power hitting. Gordon was able to declare early and win the game comfortably. In all grades he scored 3597 runs with ten half centuries and a highest score of 99.

Allan's contribution to the Club was not only on the field. He was Chairman of Selectors for a number of years and the Club's Honorary Secretary from 1986-1989. His heart was always very much with Gordon! His parents were also important members of the Gordon community, with Jim, a wonderful character, managing several sides that Allan was in and regularly attending his games over many years and the delightful Betty keeping an eye on them both so they wouldn't get into any mischief.

Towards the end of his playing career, Allan developed the insidious Parkinson's Disease. This obviously affected his ability but he cheerfully played through it. His health deteriorated over a long period but he never lost his cheeky sense of humour and his interest in the GDCC. For a few seasons he and partner Jenni would drive down to Beauchamp Park on a Saturday so Allan could watch the match and offer some advice to lower grade players.

Allan's partner, Jenni, was with him through his battles over a long period of time. She has been absolutely remarkable in the care and devotion she has shown towards him.

The Club sends her its most heartfelt sympathies.

GRAEME DONALD 'BEATLE' WATSON (1945-2020)

Graeme Watson died in Bowral on 24th April, 2020. Graeme played 14 games for Gordon over three seasons from 1976 to 1980. He scored 401 runs with a high score of 106 and took 25 wickets at 15.

Graeme Watson was an all-round sportsman who played AFL for Melbourne as well as representing three states, Victoria, NSW

and WA, during his cricket careers. A middle-order batsman and medium-pace bowler was particularly effective on wet wickets where he could cut the ball markedly.

He started with Victoria where he quickly secured a regular place and had such a good first full season with bat and ball that he was taken to South Africa where he played three of his five Tests, the other two in England.

In 1969-70 he toured New Zealand, and in 1971-72 moved to Western Australia, being a key part in their Shield-winning teams of 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1974-75. In 1971-72 he was picked for two unofficial Tests against a World XI, opening the batting, but in the second he suffered an horrific injury when hit in the face by Tony Greig. His doctors advised him to retire, but six weeks later he was playing again and was rewarded with a place on the 1972 England tour. He started with 176 against Hampshire and won a place for the first Test, making 0 and 2, and was then dropped until the Fifth Test. Overall, he had a good tour. In 1975 he moved to Sydney for a position as a marketing executive, although he was qualified as an architect, and played a few games for New South Wales. In 1977 he signed for World Series Cricket signalling the end of his first-class career.

E JAMES BAKER (1940 – 2019)

'Batman', was a right-hand batsman and wicketkeeper who first played for Gordon in the Green Shield team in the 1955-56 season. Starting in the 1956-57 season Jim played for an unbroken period of 20 years in the Club's grade teams. A few seasons after his retirement, when Jim was Club Honorary Secretary, he played a few more games, filling in after the late withdrawal of players from the Third and Fifth Grade teams.

Jim played mostly in the Second-Grade team, including five seasons as captain from 1969-70. Although a wicketkeeper, he was also a capable batsman and frequently opened the innings. In 1970-71, Jim scored 468 runs at 29.25 in Second Grade and with one innings of 20 in First Grade, a total of 488

at 28.71 in the season. He was called-up to First Grade in three different seasons.

Jim scored 5,396 runs at 20.60 in all grades for the Club (2 centuries, 29 fifties, highest score 110). He is 6th on the Gordon list of most runs in Second Grade with 3,074 at 19.83. He leads the Club in 2nd Grade keeping with 178 dismissals – 138 catches and 40 stumpings.

After eight seasons on the General Committee and a season as the Assistant Secretary, Jim became the Club's Hon Secretary in 1978-79 for four years. He was a company secretary with Tooheys Ltd and, as could be expected, he handled the Club's affairs efficiently. A major achievement was his production of the Club's 75th Anniversary Report in 1979-80. It included extracts from all previous Annual Reports and was an interesting summary of the Club's 75 years.

Jim was elected a Life Member of the Club (No. 30) in 1978. From his early days as a teenager, he was known for his enthusiasm and commitment. Never unavailable, Jim set a fine example to others throughout his long career, on and off the field. A great club man he was a very keen cricketer who always presented himself well dressed for every game with immaculate gear. Many of us were grateful recipients of hospitality as a result of Jim's company expense account over the years.

JOHN CHRISTIAN CROW (1937 – 2019)

John played for Gordon in 1950-61 mostly in 3rd Grade scoring 1,135 runs at average 13.35. He was the son of Harry Crow, past President and Life Member of the Club.

ROBERT HICKSON

Bob played two games with Gordon 1970 – 71, both in 1st Grade, as a left arm slow bowler taking 3/104. He bowled in tandem with Dick Guy or John Todd.

ALAN OLSEN (1927 - 2020)

Alan played mostly in the Colts team in 13 seasons between 1948-49 and 1974-75 with just a few games in the next two seasons. In his second season, he scored 476 runs at 29.75 (highest

scores 111*, 50). Alan was captain of Colts 1 for his last five seasons from 1970-71 but age had caught up and his batting had fallen away. Nevertheless, he is one of 25 players who scored more than 2,000 runs for the Colts with 2,052 at 16.16 (2 centuries, both not out, 111*, 104*).

He played only a few games of grade cricket scoring 174 runs at 19.33. Alan who was a handy medium-pace bowler in his early days, took 25 wickets at just 8.44 in 1959-60. His total for the Colts team was 90 wickets at 14.96 (best bowling 6-32, 5-17).

While captain he emphasized fielding as a most important part of the game and in 1974-75 introduced a fielding competition within the team. Points were allotted by his scorer wife Lenore both plus (good fielding) and minus (dropped catches or bad returns to the keeper etc.) with the winner announced at the end of the season.

Alan also assisted in teaching youngsters at Saturday morning practice at Chatswood Oval.



Financial & Auditors Report

On behalf of the Management Committee of Gordon District Cricket Club Inc (GDCC) I am pleased to report on the financial position of GDCC as at 31 May 2020 and the financial performance of its operations for the year then ended.

For the financial year GDCC reported a statutory profit of \$15,754 (2019 \$2,084). This profit was in excess of that budgeted due to higher than anticipated junior registrations, an abbreviated season and an under spend on coaching. Unlike an "ordinary" business which is aimed at making profits, GDCC is a "social" business. Profits are important as they make the Club self-

sustaining. For this reason, your Club must be and is run as a business. However, the ultimate goal is maximizing the social benefits derived by the community through involvement in cricket and associated social events. This stretches from the five-year-old Junior Blast player to the former player who attends the Golf Day and Dinner.

Your Club remains in a strong financial position with member's funds of \$126,777 (2019 \$111,023) and a significant cash reserve. This cash reserve has been artificially boosted by the receipt of fees associated with the Underarm Corporate Lunch/Charity event originally planned for October and the washed-out Golf Day which has been rescheduled to late August.

To keep the Grade playing fees affordable for a largely student playing cohort means that GDCC is heavily reliant on grants from Cricket NSW and fundraising. Major fundraising events, sponsorships and raffles contribute 35-40% of the revenue required to operate the Grade club. The impact of Covid-19 on the Club's ability to successfully conduct these fundraising activities and on the businesses of our sponsors and their ability to continue to support the Club poses a major challenge for the 2020-21 season.

The Junior Club is one of the largest clubs in the NSJCA competition. It was pleasing that registered players were up by almost 25% after a marginal increase last season preceded by two years of declining registrations. The greatest challenge faced by NSJCA remains the failure by State Government and Local Government to invest in new playing fields. Coupled with an increasing population, this has resulted in a lack of affordable available grounds which provide the facilities and playing surfaces needed to deliver a great playing experience. The Junior Club is proud of its Community Club status. The Management Committee is extremely conscious of the need to ensure that the Junior Club remains affordable and inclusive.

On behalf of the Management Committee I would like to acknowledge and thank Cricket NSW, the Club's sponsors, in particular our major sponsor Beastwear, and all those involved in the Golf Day function for their support of the Club. It would be remiss not to acknowledge those people who chose to support the Club by taking up an Associate Membership or provided services without charge.

Notes to and forming part of the financial statements For the year ended 31 May 2020

1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

a Basis of preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for the members of Gordon District Cricket Club Inc. for the purpose of fulfilling the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009.

The Club is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Gordon District Cricket Club Inc. applies Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

b Revenue recognition

Membership fees, sponsorship and coaching grants are recognised in the period to which they relate. Coaching fees are recognised upon the delivery of the service. Sales of goods are recognised at the time of sale to the customer.

Facilities development grants are recognised over the estimated useful lives of the items of plant and equipment for which the grant was received.

Other income is recognised when received.

c Expenses

Expenses were recorded in the financial statements on an accruals basis so that expenses are matched against income and recognised in the year to which they relate.

d Inventories

Inventories comprise stocks of cricket balls held for future use and club shirts and hats held for resale. Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Notes to and forming part of the financial statements For the year ended 31 May 2020 (continued)

e Property, plant and equipment

Items of cricket equipment are initially recorded at cost and depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Property plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the Management Committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets future use and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are: Cricket equipment 20%-25% straight line Motor Vehicles 20% straight line

f Facilities development grants

The Club received facilities development grants from government and sporting organisations to assist with the purchase of depreciable plant and equipment. These grants are recognised as revenue over the estimated useful lives of those items of plant and equipment for which the grant was received.

The portion of the facilities development grants attributable to future financial periods is shown as either a current or non-current other liability on the Statement of Financial Position.

g Creditors

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Club prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. These amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

h Cash and cash equivalents

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand, at call deposits with banks and at call with other financial intermediaries.

i Comparative figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Scope

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee has much pleasure in submitting for the members' consideration and adoption, the One Hundred and Fifteenth Annual Report and Balance Sheet. This rep ort is in the format that various sub-committees report to the Executive Committee.

GENERAL - ADMINISTRATION

Prior to, and during the past season, such topics as

Club Culture, Match Day Management, Improving Club Funding, identifying and prioritising Facilities/Equipment Requirements and Building the Volunteer Base were high on the agenda for the Club's Executive Committee. While considerable steps were made with regards to the first two of these topics and "baby steps" with the other items, it is safe to say that there is considerable further work that needs to be done.

In the area of "Club Culture", performance is, to an extent, reflected in a club's performance in the SCA's annual Spirit of Cricket Award. The umpires in every game that is played in the NSW Premier Cricket Competition, from 1st Grade to Green Shield, score both teams out of 10 as an acknowledgement of how those teams have "upheld the values of the game [of cricket]".

The NSW Premier Cricket website reads: "Cricket is a game that owes much of its unique appeal to the fact that it should be played not only within its Laws but also within the Spirit of the Game. The Spirit of Cricket includes respect for opponents, umpires and the game's traditional values, and emphasises the role of team captains in upholding the game's values.

In every match played, umpires assess each team's performance in terms of the Spirit of Cricket and this Award is presented to acknowledge the club that has been deemed to have best upheld those values."

During the 2019-20 Cricket Season, we are proud to announce that Gordon was the winner of the NSW Premier Cricket Spirit of Cricket Award. This is the third time the Club has won this award since it was introduced in the 2004 season.

Prior to the start of the season, the President, Geoff Hickman, established a Match Day Subcommittee with the purpose of attempting to improve the quality of our hosting of matches, especially at our lower-grade grounds. Ground Managers were appointed and, whenever possible, Match-Day Managers were present throughout the day to arrange drinks, organise afternoon teas, coordinate covers and clean and lock pavilions at the end of play. This had the benefit of assisting to build on the volunteer base for the Club and was generally a successful exercise. Special mention must be made of Michael Falk who was coerced onto the Match Day Subcommittee but then attended every playing day at Beauchamp Park throughout the season. There is no doubt that his presence at the ground assisted in winning the Spirit of Cricket Award.

Yet again this year, Tim Cubbage's amazing contribution to the day-to-day running of the Club was so much appreciated. Tim and his partner have bought a B&B in the Hunter Valley and, while Tim will be available to get the new season up and running, he will not be around to assist on training and match days. Houston, we have a problem!

The Annual Golf Day has been a major revenue source for the Club for the past 8 or 9 seasons. This year, even though we were due to be back at the re-furbished Killara Golf Club, it rained!! While a very successful and enjoyable dinner was held at the KGC, with Damien Fleming as our Special Guest, there was NO GOLF! This had a significant impact on the Club's revenue for the season but it is hoped to get back to normal next season.

Peter Klemt again provided the link with our sponsors and was also involved with the planning of a revised End-of-Season Awards function to be held at the Crow's Nest Hotel. Unfortunately, Coronavirus put paid to all activities after the middle of March and this function was cancelled. Peter has given notice that he is stepping back from his activities at the Club and now the search is on for people to take over this role. The Club is greatly appreciative of Peter's work over many years.

Michael Cant again headed the Club's Cricket Committee with responsibility for recruitment, retention of players, selections, coaching and training. Unfortunately, the 2019-20 season was not one of our better seasons on the field. A series of retirements of experienced players, injuries, illness and innumerable drop-outs throughout the various grades caused constant changing of team combinations and nightmares for the selectors. On several occasions, there were insufficient numbers of players to field a Colts/Metro Cup team resulting in needing to forfeit games. This was very disappointing after winning this competition in the previous season.

There are a number of very talented young players at the Club but it is going to take two or three seasons for them to perform consistently and be in a position to replace the guys who have been there for most of the past 8-10 years. This was reflected in the performance of our Poidevin Gray team this season, reaching the Conference Final despite losing several key players due to injury or illness at important times.

Geoff Keevers, Treasurer. I simply can't find words to describe what a sensational service Geoff provides to the Club. And, in his spare time, he was regularly seen providing assistance at our home venues on playing days.

Bob Thomas continued in his role as Junior Development and Country Liaison Director. Bob has a sizeable network of contacts across NSW and, as a throwback from being a school teacher for forty years, does a lot of homework identifying the better young cricketers across the state for possible inclusion in the Club's Country Program. Bob, in his other role as a Club Selector, aged dramatically during the season. Premature greying of his formerly "Princely" locks was caused by his sight of his excessive mobile phone bill resulting from trying to make up the numbers in our Metro's team on Friday nights following a series of player drop-outs.

Paul Stephenson, while not being a member of the Executive Committee, oversaw the development and commissioning of the Club's new website which now, after some teething problems, provides a clean and modern medium for club communications. Paul's periodic articles about former players, especially those servants of the Club who have passed on or who fought in wars, are always excellent reading. Meanwhile, several current players looked after the Social Media aspects of the Club's communications.

Jim Cattlin was again, for the 13th year, the official Club Secretary. He provided much of the dayto-day communications with local councils and other clubs and assisted greatly at home grounds on match days.

Scott Hinton attended most EC meetings during the season, officially as a "guest". Scott has a great understanding of what is happening at DCA level in Sydney through his involvement at the North Shore District Cricket Association as well as through the Gordon Junior Cricket Club. Our thanks go to Scott and also to Dave Bezer, the President of the Junior Club, for their assistance and support throughout the season. These two are very experienced campaigners in sport in our region.

MEN'S CRICKET

Marshall Rosen and Andrew Falk have been the Club's delegates to the Sydney Cricket Association for the past twenty-one years. Marshall, after 13 years as a Director of Cricket NSW, did not re-contest his position at the AGM in September. He subsequently retired as the Club's Delegate to CNSW and the SCA but remains the Chair of the Cricket NSW Cricket Committee and is on the CNS Wilson Park Development Committee. Andrew, after 17 years on the SCA's Committee of Management, did not re-stand as Chairman of the SCA's Committee of Management at its AGM in August 2019 but was elected as Deputy Chairman. In November, following Marshall's retirement, he took over as the Club's Delegate to CNSW while Michael Cant put his hand up as the second Delegate to the SCA.

For a fifth year, the Australian Cricketers' Association (ACA) allocated funds to every Premier Club across Australia for payment to an ACA Member to coach and/or play for that club. Funds were also available for female Premier clubs. Again this season, the Men's Club used these funds to secure the coaching services of Trevor Chappell while the Women's Club also benefitted from this funding. Over the past five years, the ACA has provided more than \$5M to Premier clubs, male and female, across Australia through this program.

For the second time this season, National Premier T20 Championships were held in Adelaide. The winners of each state and territory's Premier T20 competitions competed over two days. NSW was represented by the two KST20 conference winners, Hawkesbury (Thunder) and Sydney (Sixers), the latter club being the eventual winners. Again this carnival, fully funded by CA, was reported to be a highly successful event.

During the season, the SCA Committee of Management was put under pressure in several unusual areas. The first of these occurred before Christmas and revolved around "safe air quality". Bushfires around the Sydney basin caused visibility and breathing difficulties for players (and everybody else, for that matter) and the SCA was required to develop a "Safe Air Policy".

Then just after Christmas, the Extreme Heat Policy, which had been in place for the previous 4 seasons, was rigorously tested with several playing days that were clearly unsafe for players to be outdoors let alone exerting themselves on a sporting field.

And finally, just as the preliminary rounds were completed, we had Coronavirus! Finals series matches were not permitted to proceed and everyone needed to come to terms with "lock-downs", "social distancing" and "self-isolation"!! Consequently, the Minor Premiers in each grade were declared the Premiers and the uncertainty of when live sport, including cricket, will resume in Australia is, at the time of writing this report, still to be determined.

Finally, the SCA is very appreciative of the significant funding that continues to be provided to Premier Clubs in NSW by sponsors McDonalds, Kookaburra, Cricketers Arms (Asahi) and Kingsgrove Sports.

Yet again, Jessica Henry, the long-serving President of the GDCC Women's Division, served on the CNSW Cricket Sub-Committee. She also remained a member of the SCA's Women's Competition Sub-Committee. Long-time servant of cricket in Sydney, Stirling Hamman, was Chair of the SCA Women's Competition Subcommittee for the third year.

Participation numbers are steadily growing in women's cricket, especially "at the bottom end". The important problem that needs to be solved at the present time is to fill the holes that are left when the talented players "at the top" exit Premier Cricket on representative duties

There are large numbers of young girls starting to experience the sport and this has prompted the Women's Subcommittee to develop an Under 15's competition run by the Premier clubs rather than by "Community" cricket. While a pilot program was played in the previous season, several new (women's) clubs, generally each with the support of a Premier Men's club, participated in this competition this season. Matches were played from mid-January until mid-March, when COVID-19 restrictions caused the cessation of all cricket.

I'd like to thank all the coaches and everyone on the cricket committee for the work they put in throughout the year. There is a huge amount to be done and your efforts are greatly appreciated.

PERFORMANCES

Our position in the club championship (12th) was down on recent years. We made the finals in PGs and 1st grade limited overs and just missed out on the Green Shield semi-finals. However, none of our teams challenged for the grade competition semi-finals. As it turned out all of the grade semi-finals were cancelled due to the coronavirus restrictions, so it was perhaps not the worst season to be miss out on qualifying.

After a reasonable start to the season, our performances fell away in the middle and latter part of the season. In part this was due to injuries and unavailability's, which hurt our playing strength throughout the club.

It was a rebuilding season for 1st grade who blooded quite a number of new players. The team played some excellent cricket at times and were competitive for most of the year. Unfortunately, bad sessions cost us, as did our inability to win the close games. We played our best cricket in the limited overs competition and made the finals (6th place). However, torrential rain washed out the quarter final without a ball being bowled, leaving us to rue missed opportunities in the rounds that could have seen us finish top 4 and the safety of being the higher ranked team come finals time.

2nd grade showed some real promise during the year and were in the finals hunt for most of the season. They had some great wins but lost other games against teams we should have beaten. Strategy and Development Report

2019/2020 was the second year of our 5-year strategic plan 2018-2023, which focused on the implementation of five key priorities in achieving our mission to be regarded as Sydney's leading Premier Cricket Club. We continue to engage with Cricket NSW in order to seek support and guidance in developing best practices to improve the functioning of our club.

This year has proven particularly challenging, given the disruption brought about by the response to the Covid-19 pandemic which is likely to continue into the upcoming

season. The Executive Committee have been meeting on a fortnightly basis to respond to changes in the situation as they arise. We will also undertake a review our plans and adapt to the new reality as this becomes clearer.

A key objective underpinning the strategy was to establish a strong positive culture within the club. As indicated in the last annual report, the "Gordon Spirit" was reviewed and actions taken to embed the values in the fabric of our club. To track the effectiveness of this, a key measure was to be consistently ranked in the top 5 clubs in the NSW Premier Cricket Spirit of Cricket awards. Gordon was announced as the winners of the Spirit of Cricket Award for Season 2019/2020, with all but two teams finishing in the top three in their respective Grades. We are ahead of our ambition in this objective; however, "culture" is fragile and needs continual attention and reinforcement.

A major development to improve the clubs' finances was the planned introduction of a second significant fundraiser, scheduled for later in the year. However, as a result of the lockdown and isolation measures this has been postponed to 2021. Revenue from our annual golf day was similarly affected. While the club remains in a healthy financial position as evidenced in the Financial Report, we expect a material reduction in our normal income from grants and sponsorship. Plans are being developed to address this potential shortfall.

The 5-year plan recognised the need to improve the available playing facilities at Chatswood, Beauchamp and Killara Ovals. The drainage and playing surface improvements at Beauchamp Oval were completed before the start of last season and, with a few more months and less usage it will hopefully improve further. Similarly, the playing surface and practice wickets at Chatswood were improved last season and may benefit from a few months of reduced activity.

The first stages of implementation of the Chatswood Oval masterplan have begun and, while no changes are envisaged to the playing surface, the removal of the Cedric Pike Pavilion, a new walking track and some improvements and shading of the seating at the southern end of the ground will improve the overall environment around the Oval. We are encouraged by Council's intention to develop an indoor sports facility at the Gore Hill Oval site, and we are providing our input to this plan.

The playing surface at Killara Oval was marginally improved, but the addition of a new picket fence around the playing area has significantly improved the look of the ground. As a result, we have seen some improvement in the ranking of these grounds overall with Chatswood rising to 12 of 20 among first grade grounds; with Beauchamp 18 of 41 and Killara 32 of 41 of lower grade grounds. A small improvement but a considerable amount of work still to be done. We will need to work closely with Council as they develop their plans in the coming few months.

As indicated in last years' report the Club has continued to develop its communications capability with a new website launched. Use of social media platforms has continued to grow strongly with Facebook followers increasing by over 33%, Twitter by 17% and Instagram by 25%.

We continue to maintain good relationships with the Women's and Junior clubs and have taken early steps to work more closely with the Lindfield Shires club. The opportunity to build a broader community remains, as with the need to link with key schools in our area.

The season just completed saw us finish in 12th position in the Club Championship with the retirement of several key senior players in recent times seeing the Club in a period of rebuilding. The performances of our Poidevin-Grey and Green Shield teams last season were very encouraging, and further developments to the coaching structure auger well for the future.

The key area where we have not progressed as we would have expected is in the strengthening of our volunteer base. For the upcoming season, the club needs to recruit several key resources due to upcoming vacancies on the executive and in matchday management. Above all, the implementation of a programme to identify and recruit additional volunteer support is currently the most pressing issue faced.

We look forward to another interesting and challenging season, adjusting to cricket in the immediate post-pandemic era.

One hundred years on and Gordon's cricketers return from the war

If you want a trivia question that no one is likely to answer, here it is.

Who was Don Bradman's boyhood hero, who played Test Rugby and Test cricket for Australia?

The Don had stated many times that the one player he tried to emulate, not just for his batting style and amazing ability in the field but also for his renowned modesty was Johnny Taylor, who played 5 seasons with Gordon after the war starting in 1920.

With 5 senior first grade players from the start of last season

not available for Gordon this coming 2020-21 season, maybe we need to look back to the 1920-21 season for some inspiration.

A look at our history shows that seven current or future Test and NSW cricketers joined Gordon after the war including Johnny. I would love to research why that happened, was it their concurrent trips to the 3rd London General Hospital during the war, or maybe some of them being part of the post war AIF cricket team? Whoever was chairman of the GDCC recruitment committee in 1920 needs a medal.

When Gordon historians talk about our great early players, the obvious names of Trumper, Macartney and Oldfield are always mentioned, but not many list Johnny Taylor amongst that elite group. If you want a combination of war hero, all-round sportsman and a man of exceptional character then you can't go past Johnny.

Johnny Taylor was recognised as the most brilliant sportsman in the history of Newington College. He played in the cricket 1st XI from 1909, at the age of fourteen, until 1915, scoring twelve centuries and three double centuries; and in the Combined GPS 1st XI for five years, two as Captain. He played Sheffield Shield cricket for NSW in 1914–15 while still at school. He played in the Rugby 1st XV for five years and in the Combined GPS 1st XV for four. He shot in the Rifle Team for four years and was a member of the Athletics team for five. He was awarded Triple Colours five times, a feat unique in Newington's history. Despite his successes he was very popular due to his friendliness and as his legendary modesty.

Johnny enlisted with the AIF on 8 October, 1916 with his application form stating his age as 20 years and 11/12. With his Rifle Team experience Johnny was recruited to the 1st Field Artillery Brigade as a gunner.

Johnny left Australia in February 1917, however didn't get to the front line in France until November 1917, having undergone training at the British Royal School of Artillery at Lark Hill near Stonehenge. It was also because the England cricket







establishment were missing their cricket so much, they arranged for several matches to be played at Lords in 1917 between an England side and soldiers from Australia, India and South Africa. Charlie Macartney being a current Test player at the time must have known Johnny was in London and had him recruited to the team.

The Dominions team had Gordon players Charlie Kelleway opening the batting and Macartney, Taylor and Moyes at 3, 4 and 5 in the order.


Maybe that was where the recruitment work started?

I am sure Johnny would have thought "what might have been" as his delayed arrival to the front line, due to the cricket matches, meant he missed the Battle of Passchendaele by one week where there were 13,000 Allied casualties in what is known as Australia's worst day in battle. The 1st Division lost 2,448 men that day in October 1917.

Johnny then spent the next five months with the 1st Division in the Messines area of Belgium. In March 1918, the 1st Division were sent to the Amiens area to defend against the Spring offensive and on March 26, Johnny was badly wounded in his right knee from enemy fire. After a short stay in a French hospital, his knee became septic and he was returned to the 3rd London General Hospital. His injury was so severe he remained in London until 1st November 2018, when he was returned to his unit in Amiens.

In March 1919, Johnny was transferred to the AIF headquarters in Belgium before travelling back to London in May to join the AIF Cricket Team tour of the UK. He followed this tour with another tour of South Africa from September to December 1919. The team also played three matches in Australia before being abandoned in 1920.

Following the war, the AIF administration had the unenviable task of transporting the remaining soldiers back home. There simply weren't enough ships available, as the 200,000 remaining troops had all arrived progressively over the preceding four years. The basic rule was that the early arrivals would get the first transport available and the balance would go home, based on their length of time in the war. There were some exceptions, however, like necessary professions such as doctors and nurses who were given early transport. Those who were wounded, of course, were also given preferential treatment. The planning, though, meant that most of 1919 would be needed to move the troops who were naturally very keen to return home to their loved ones. But at least they were safe.




Johnny Taylor in 1920

While the majority of the Gordon cricketers who went to war, never played cricket again, there were several who not only continued playing but became household names in our history. These were players such as Charlie Macartney, Charlie Kelleway, Bert Oldfield, Jack Prowse, Johnny Taylor, Rupert Ellsmore, Harry Watts, Johnnie Moyes, Austin Diamond and Syd Trumper.

The annual report for the 1919/20 season proudly announced that eight war veterans had played in first grade in the final match of that season.

Johnny Taylor arrived at Chatswood for the start of the 1920-21 season and played nine games with the Gordon Club over the next two seasons in between his Test and NSW commitments which included five Tests against England. Three Gordon cricketers Taylor, Macartney and Oldfield

played in that series and the club secretary, Syd Smith, was the team manager.

From 1922 to 1928, Johnny spent six seasons at Sydney University due to the studies he was undertaking at the university.

While Johnny was taking the cricket and rugby world by storm over this period, he was constantly hampered by his war injuries and spent long periods in hospital.

He returned to Gordon for three full seasons in his early thirties from 1928 to 1931. In the 1929-30 season Johnny scored 779 runs at 59.92 in only 14 innings.

Overall, Johnny scored 1,839 runs for Gordon at an average of 42 including scores of 141 and 140 in his final two seasons. Between 1920 and 1926, he played twenty Test matches for Australia and 135 First Class matches. He also played two Rugby Tests with the Wallabies in 1922. Imagine what he might have achieved if playing on two good legs?

Johnny graduated from the University of Sydney with a Bachelor of Dental Surgery in 1926 and managed a dental practice in Macquarie Street, Sydney. He was very proud of his school heritage and remained involved in various capacities with Newington College. In November 2013, the College named their Sports Centre after him. Johnny remained in the Gordon area after he retired and died in Turramurra in May 1971 at the age of seventy-five.

While the Gordon first grade team taking the field for the first match of the 2020/21 season will be different to previous years, let's hope there will be another Johnny Taylor ready to make their mark for Gordon. Although the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War has produced many articles, documentaries, books and films about the carnage and horror of the fighting, it is still difficult to comprehend the sacrifices paid or the zeal with which the men initially went to fight. Nevertheless, to honour their memory, the high standards of duty, commitment and perseverance which they set, the Gordon players continuing to take the field in their place since then can emulate their spirit so that their deaths and injuries will never be forgotten.

First Grade Report

The 2019/20 campaign was a season of what could have been. Play was interrupted by rain on many occasions leaving games unfinished and points shared for both teams. We started the season as well as possible, with a bonus point victory, before falling into a pattern of losing many close games by thirty runs or less, or needing a couple more wickets to secure victory. We had good success in the oneday limited overs competition and it was great to see our skills develop in this form of the game. We also saw the end of some great careers, with veteran first grade players hanging up their boots.

After the final match of the season, Steve Colley announced that it was also his last game for the club. Travelling down from the Central Coast, Steve has been a stalwart for the club since starting in Green Shield in 2006. At Gordon he is now fifth on the all-time run scorers for the club, which is a remarkable achievement. Steve was also a more than useful off-spinner in his early days at the club; but these were rarely seen towards the back end of his career. I do have a great memory of Steve caught by surprise to open the bowling in a T20 match against Mosman, and he cleaned up the opener, before going out to hit 69 not out with the bat. Steve was also a great fielder taking 114 catches for Gordon, many of those in the slips.

Fittingly, Steve finished his final innings in the middle of

Chatswood Oval, 28 not out, when rain stopped play. Over the years, Steve was known to be 'allergic' to rain and would be the first back in the sheds when droplets came from the sky. Although announcing he was finishing up, he did hold onto his gear so there is still potential for a comeback if the chipping yips get the better of him on the golf course. Well done on an outstanding career Steve.

Cameron Eccles, another long serving top order batsman, also called time on his first-grade career. Cam is an easy going fellow from Scone who began his Gordon career in third grade, in 2007. He demonstrated quickly that he was too classy for third grade and saw himself rise to the top grade in the following season. During his tenure, he hit ten centuries for the club, mostly when opening the batting. Cam was one of the most underrated opening batsmen in the competition. Opening the batting is the hardest place to bat and our strong middle order were thankful to have a shield like Cam over many years.

One of Cam's highlights would have been his innings of 135 against St George, at Hurstville. I was lucky to be opening the batting with him in this one-day match and I remember getting off to a fast start. I was later dismissed leaving Cam to dominate the scoring, which he did, finishing with a flurry of sixes towards the end of his innings. However, it was his gritty nature to battle through the tough periods of the innings and come through with a positive outcome which stood

out for me. Another good example of Cam's resilience was against Campbelltown, at Raby in the 2018/19 season. We were in trouble after losing early wickets, however Cam's display glued the innings together with Steve. Cam batted for over four hours, scoring 102 and was the eighth wicket to fall, almost holding his bat.

Finally, I could not leave out the one dismissal Cam managed to snare under the captaincy of Brett Rosen. Cam was a solid net bowler, when he had a new kookaburra in his hands and Brett decided to give him a trundle at Old Kings. The

scorebook reads, C White 38, bowled C Eccles. C Eccles 8 overs, 1 for 35. Yes, they won convincingly. Well done on a fantastic career to date and hopefully we see you in the lower grades in the coming years.

Alex Patterson is another player who played his last game for the Stags this season. After playing at Bankstown and then Terrigal on the Central Coast, Alex debuted for Gordon in the 2017/18 season. Patto was a genuine swing bowler who took fifty wickets opening the bowling. As a captain, you knew you would get a whole-hearted effort from Patto and he quickly became a

popular member of the playing group. Alex was also the Club Captain in his final year and was an outstanding leader of culture. Driving down from the Central Coast to run in and bowl all night at training, demonstrated the commitment required to reach your potential in Cricket. I hope many of the young stags were watching. Great effort, Patto!

Charlie Stobo was again outstanding opening the bowling, but also expanded his role as a lower order batsman this season. Being the leader of the attack meant bowling many overs from the top end, running downhill, with the wind, whilst the battlers ran into stiff breezes up the hill. Charlie was our top wicket-taker and on many occasions bowled through significant pain. This was highlighted against Northern Districts where he

battled through 24 overs of discomfort and took 5-58 helping the Stags secure victory over local rivals by 7 runs. He also scored 53 runs with the willow in the first innings; it was performances like these that led to Charlie being awarded the joint Player of the Year for the club. Well-deserved, Stobes!

After five games *Harry Evans* set off to work and live in England. The loss of Harry's experience and consistency with the bat left a hole that we hoped our overseas player from Yorkshire, Will Fraine would fill. On Will's debut, he injured his knee and returned home for surgery. This led to a great opportunity for some of our lower order batsmen, but also *Lachlan Barnsley*. Lachie produced a couple of outstanding performances with the bat and demonstrated his potential for the upcoming seasons. Against St George he almost got us over the line scoring 106*, his maiden first grade ton. He also scored four more half-centuries including a 90 against Northern Districts, setting us up for victory.

As some of our experienced players were finishing up their careers, it was great to watch our young talent get their first taste of the top grade. Nathan Doyle, Jamie Bekis, Josh Claridge, Ryan Tullia and Matt Wright made good starts to their first grade careers and with consistent hard work I am confident they will have a big part to play in the coming seasons.

Second Grade Report

Second grade had a topsy-turvy 2019/20 season. Most players were established higher graders and a year older and wiser from the previous year's inconsistencies... or so we thought. Once again, the year held glimpses of brilliance throughout a season that was far too inconsistent for such a talented bunch of players.

The second graders finished the season in 11th spot with five victories (one of which was outright), 3 draws and 7 defeats – a fairly disappointing collection. The first half of the season went as planned with some excellent victories, displaying skill and application when it was needed the most. Sadly, however, as is often the case at Gordon the team drifted off quite badly towards the back end of the season – particularly the batting unit.

With a wealth of talent in the side, it is frustrating to the selectors, coaches and supporters that stand by to watch how much the second-grade side has struggled with the application of batters over the past few years.

Overall, the bowling and fielding was good. The addition of Jackson Saggers bowling thunderbolts along with a fully fit Matt Keevers, it was a joy to watch the bowling unit go about their business at times. The spin brothers of Matt Wright and Ryan Meppem were brilliant in tandem once again, regularly making things happen out of nothing. The fielding was particularly good throughout the season, which is to be expected from a young vibrant team – they supported the bowlers very well and ensured that pressure built on the batters in



the big moments. I predict big things for the bowling unit at the club in the coming years if fitness can be sustained throughout the season.

Despite a disappointing season, there were several players worth a mention for having successful seasons.

Matt Wright had an excellent season with ball in hand taking 26 wickets @ 18.96. Always willing to bowl regardless of the situation, he stuck to the plan usually collecting batters' pads on the back foot much to the dismay of the surrounding fielders. Matt also collected First Grade caps in T20 and 50 over cricket this year, a feat that was richly deserved for the youngster.

Matt Keevers also had a great year with the ball. Initially starting in Third Grade, he didn't leave the selectors much option to promote him after stellar performances. In second grade he took 18 wickets @ 19.56 from just 10 games. Another one to watch heading for the grade above.

The dark horse of the year was Simon Read. He only played the final two matches, however, he

showed he was well and truly up to the mark taking 8 wickets @ 9.25. This included figures of 5/19 in the final match of the season.

Moving onto our batters, Josh Claridge was arguably the find of the summer for the Stags. Josh rolled down from Newcastle for his first match where he crunched 117* as casually as you like. He scored 339 runs @ 113 in just 8 innings. Obviously, a promotion to the top grade followed. What a brilliant start to his Gordon career.

The ever-reliable Dom Thomson scored 373 runs @ 31.08 (H.S. 96*), another good year for the Second Grade

veteran. By his own admission, there were plenty of starts that could have been converted into big scores, but it was still another productive season for the opening bat.

Ryan Tullia also had a year to remember, deservedly being promoted to the top grade after consistently performing in Second Grade. Ryan scored 366 runs @ 40.67 (H.S. 75) at the top of the order. A fantastic effort considering he was playing Fifth Grade a couple of years ago – hard work pays off.

Jamie Bekis is another batter that has started showing what he can do with the willow in hand. After an extremely productive off-season, Jamie started in Third Grade and only took the one match to be promoted. His first match in second grade saw him score a thunderous 165* to lead the team to victory. Jamie scored 337 runs @ 48.14 and earned a promotion to the top grade towards the back end of the season.

A huge thank you must go out to all our helpers and volunteers throughout the season. Jim Cattlin, Geoff Keevers, Michael Weaver, Tim Cubbage, Pistol Pete, Glenn Tullia and everybody else that helped (apologies if I missed anybody) were brilliant as ever this year and everybody that played in the team appreciated all of the hours you put in supporting and helping at our matches.

Lastly, a special thank you to our dedicated scorer, Andy 'The Bull' Baldwin and our acting manager Jim Wright. Andy did not miss a beat throughout the entire season. There was not a stray dot in his score book, along with the linear sheets he had going every match (I didn't know they existed before this season), he was fantastic to have from the captains perspective and I know the team appreciated his help and expertise throughout the season.

Jim was fantastic again this season. Only there as a supporter, always offered his help for anything he could. From scoring to offering constructive feedback from the outsiders view after matches, he made my life easier and in turn, made everybody else's easier at the same time.

Overall, thinking back to a season that 'could have been' it is disappointing where we finished. In saying that, this season was an improvement on the previous season and if we keep heading in the right direction, I have no doubt that the Second Grade of the future will begin to be very successful.

Third Grade Report

Our season stared strongly with dominant wins in the first four rounds led by new captain Liam McElduff. In round 1 a strong bowling performance, led by Matt Keevers with 4 wickets kept Sutherland to a modest total of 205. This was well chased by a thumping innings of 86 by Jamie Bekis, well supported by young Nikhil Ahluwalia with 63 (a player to watch for the future).

A shortened round 2 saw Gordon brush aside Penrith for 101 courtesy of a superb 5-fa from Austyn Nugent which was strongly chased down by a composed 60 from

Michael Fletcher and a solid 44 from Liam McElduff. Round 3 was a clinical affair with Randy-Petes held to 194 courtesy of a fine bowling display with 4 wickets to Matt Keevers (again showing his potential to play in the higher grades) ably chased down by The Stags with Darren Jayasekera scoring 77. Round 4 was easily our most dominant performance of the season with Campbelltown dismissed for 135 on day 1 with Dan Stickland taking 5 wickets. A slight wobble in the 2nd innings had some spectators feeling a little nervous but Dan Chillingworth saw us home with a composed 33, with Liam McElduff doing the hard work early with 44.

A strong start to the season, however it is worth noting this was mainly due to good performances from players who were promoted to higher grades, or were unfortunately injured, for the rest of the season.

From Round 5 our season began taking on a downward trend and familiar issues began to come to the surface. Blacktown managed to accrue 7/249 at the end of their 50 overs, with. Lachlan Burrows on 3rd grade debut taking 3 wickets. In response only Darren Jayasekera stood tall with the bat with 55 as the rest of the batting unit struggled. A close limited overs loss followed against Hawkesbury in Rd 6 despite Vikrant Nehru's best efforts, scoring 67 in the first innings and 3 wickets in the second. Very difficult to win a game of cricket off the back of one man's efforts...

Our struggles with the bat continued in our 2 day game against Bankstown in round 7. Liam McElduff started our innings strongly with 44 however found partners hard to come by with only Nick Andreou doing his fighting best with 58. 189 would never be enough with Bankstown cruising past the total 2 down before finally ending the game at 3/229.

We finished the first half of the season with a high scoring draw against St George at Harold Fraser. The Saints declared at 9/360 with Vikrant Nehru producing another fine effort to take 5 wickets. We replied with 5/306 with Arvin Niranjan compiling a great 91* and Liam McElduff, in another captain's knock, scoring 72. Also a mention must be made of Fraser Wilson who marked his final game with the club (before heading to study in Queensland) with a sparkling 45* proving he has what it takes to play at this level should he find himself back in Sydney.

We hoped, with a New Year, new fortunes would greet the Stags. However this was not to be, with a loss against UNSW who scored 4/212 compared with our reply of 191. We were rusty in

both departments, yet Vikrant Nehru showed us yet another glimpse of his potential with 42 runs, but was eclipsed by young Tom Chapman making 52 on debut and keeping very tidily. Our Rd 11 encounter against Parramatta continued our trend of just falling short with Gordon's 164 passed with 9 balls remaining. The less that is said of our round 12 performance against Mosman, the better. Our batting collapsed against the eventual runners-up, bundled out for 68 before Mosman passed the total 3 wickets down and rain prevented further embarrassment on day 2.

Taking over the reins from Liam McElduff, after an unfortunate injury, presented an exciting challenge to re-invigorate the side and finish the season strongly. Rain washed out Day 1 of our round 13 match against Northern Districts. Fortunately the rain relented sufficiently to allow a 120-over match to take place on day 2. Having lost the toss, Gordon were asked to bat on a surface promising assistance to the bowlers, with an unacceptably long outfield making scoring even more challenging.

Amazingly, Gordon were able to accrue 178 runs after 65 over. An outstanding effort, which felt like 300 given there was such low value offered for your shots. Rahul Krishna was a standout performer scoring 68, ably supported by Nick Andreou with 34. In reply, Northern Districts never got off the ground, bundled over for 51. Simon Read standing tall with 4/15 off his 9 overs, excellently supported by Dan Stickland (3/10 off 10) and young Callum Bladen on Third grade debut (3/6 off 6.3); a terrific bounce-back after the horrors of the previous round.



Next up a stern challenge against Sydney awaited a Stags side full of confidence. Day 1 saw a superbly disciplined

bowling display restrict Sydney to 203 all out at the end of 78th over on a wicket well suited to batting. Excellent efforts came from Dan Stickland, the pick of the bowlers (4/51 off 15.4), with Matt Keevers showing his class with 3/39 off 18. Unfortunately, the batsmen were unable to replicate the standard of the bowling unit on Day 2, with Gordon brushed aside for 111. This was a frustratingly common theme throughout the 3rd grade season and one that needs addressing for this side to have any success in the near future.

Round 15 was a dull affair with the still much needed rain winning the day. Fairfield-Liverpool were 4/37 off 13.4 overs when play was abandoned leaving the Stags wondering what could have been.

These last 3 rounds provided a curious snapshot of the team's whole season - flashes of brilliance, failing to capitalise on strong positions, disciplined and competitive one day, not so much the next and the victim to a lot of circumstance. In my mind the main issue was a team that promised so much potential yet continually underperformed in the batting department. The bowling attack was always competitive even with fine bowlers in Austyn Nugent and Daniel Chillingworth unavailable due to injury for most of this season. This team has the potential to at least play finals, and it is my hope that they have learnt a thing or two about their game, where and how they can improve so they arrive at pre-season raring to go and excited at the opportunity to "go around one more time." Until then, stay safe and keep well.

Fourth Grade Report

Unfortunately, a combination of narrow losses, washouts and draws meant a fourth consecutive year of finals appearances couldn't be delivered by 4th Grade this season.

While the end result wasn't ideal with a 14th place finish, there were certainly some great wins against top teams, a number of outstanding individual performances and positives steps made by some of our younger stags who will no doubt feature in higher grades over the years ahead.

Before going into depth with the standout notable performances, the individual averages and totals give a clear picture of the solid and consistent contributions from players throughout the season.

The batting average was taken out by one of the clubs most powerful and prolific run scorers, Mitch Kleem. He is a batsman who can destroy an opening bowling attack and put his team in a winning position in just 10 overs of attacking shots. It wouldn't be uncommon for Mitch over the years, to make a half century before his partners hit double figures. His time in 4th grade was brief as his scores warranted a move up to Third grade, but he finished with an average of 34.80, over Shiv Rana with 31.60 and Stuart Bromley at 31.44. Worth a particular mention was one of our bowlers who regularly batted around number 10 or 11, Kartik Khetarpaul. He actually



finished in the top 5 with an average of 26.5 being dismissed only twice in his 5 innings, which also included an impressive 37 against NDs in round 13.

The batting aggregate went to captain Stuart Bromley with 283, including highlights of 55* against Sutherland and a 78 against a St George side, which included multiple ex first graders. Bromley was just a run ahead of one of the stars of 4th grade this season – Rahul Krishna, whose 282 runs included a match winning 127* against Parramatta and a 56 against Campbelltown. In the bowling stakes the wickets aggregate was taken out by young gun Callum Blade, who became a wicket taking machine after a slow start, finishing with 15 wickets before moving up to Third grade. His best performances included 5/21 and 5/39 Against Bankstown and St George, certainly a star of the future.

The bowling average this year went to a player we only had for a handful of games but his extremely tight line and length bowling made it very hard for batsman to score and very easy for a captain to set a field. Karan Tiwari was content to be patient with his bowling and very rarely produced a bad ball, forcing the opposition to play risky shots if they wanted to score. His quality bowling maturity and consistency delivered him an average of 12.67, with best figures of 3/31.

While we had many great individual performances, there were three clear standouts this season. The first was delivered by English powerhouse Josh Porter. In the first innings of the round 4 clash against Campbelltown the Stags were in trouble at 3/26, but Porter steadied the ship and amassed a match winning 159 in the approximate 54 overs spent at the crease, consisting of 19 fours and 4 sixes, one of the highest scores in the club this season.

The second and easily the most nail biting performance was from the classy Rahul Krishna in a one day game against Parramatta, who had set a strong 238 runs off their 50 overs. At 4/15 from the first 6 overs the game was well and truly slipping away, but Rahul kept an extremely cool head under intense bowling pressure and played one of the best innings I have seen as a captain, given the situation. The run rate was carefully

monitored and just when it would creep up, Rahul and his batting partners (Rana, Schembri-Green and Sequira) would pick things up a notch. Needing 5 to win off the last over, it was only fitting that Rahul would hit a boundary to win the game with 3 balls to spare, finishing on 127 not out. His father was potentially the happiest man in Australia that day! This was an innings that won't be forgotten and one which earned Rahul the move up to Third grade.

The third of the Fourth-grade season highlights came at the hands of off spinner Conor Clift, who decimated the ND's batting line up in round 13. Defending 238 and with only 1 wicket from the first 21 overs, Clift in his first game with 4th grade, was thrown the ball to weave some magic.

The young spinner had the ball on a string, with line length and flight all firing. He proceeded to take the wickets of ND's batsmen numbers 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 11, finishing with an amazing 7/56 off 16.4 overs, easily ensuring victory for his team mates.

Overall, it wasn't the desired result on the competition ladder, but there were certainly positives in the season. This was one of the youngest 4th grade squads in recent years and these young guns will become assets to the club as their maturity and skill build over the years ahead, growth which can only come from going through some tough losses against strong opponents. A big thanks you to all behind the scenes at the club, but for 4th grade specifically, Sam and Tony for scoring



Fifth Grade Report

ANNUAL REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 2019-2020

Poidevin Gray Shield Report

There was a huge sense of excitement at the beginning of the 2019/20 season with such a promising group of young Stags. Coupled with the return of club legend Charles Stobo as coach and the greatest manager in the history of sport, Rob Carruthers, a promising PG's season beckoned. What became apparent quite early in the campaign was that, unlike most other teams, there was great depth throughout the whole squad.

This depth was showcased in the round one T20 game against a Manly team boasting 2 statecontracted players. Batting first the Stags were bowled out for 125 in the last over with a lone halfcentury to Jamie Bekis the only score above 15. Manly soon raced away to be 0-45 from 5 overs.

Nonetheless, the major emphasis for the team this season was that taking 1 or 2 key wickets in PG's cricket can turn the game in a matter of overs. This is exactly what happened, as the Young Stags went on to take 7-67 from the remaining 15 overs, restricting Manly to 8-112 from their 20 overs.

The win was highlighted by a true team performance with the ball as 4 bowlers took 2 wickets each, with the highlights being Glenn Winsor taking 2-8 from his 4 overs (with 2 maidens), and Daniel Chillingworth taking 2-14 from his 4.

Buoyed from the round one victory, the Young Stags ventured to Allan Border Oval to take on the defending champions, Mosman. Losing the toss and bowling on a flat wicket had the potential to be a challenging 50 overs, but once again the team produced a dominant bowling

and fielding display. Vikrant Nehru came into the side after Austyn Nugent was unable to play Sunday cricket due to injury, and began with a bang taking the big wicket of their best batsman.

From there, the Stags squeezed the Whales out of the game, bowling them out for 172 after 43 overs. Again, the prevailing feature of the game was shared success, with each bowler taking a wicket highlighted again by Winsor (3-48) and Chillingworth (2-10). The run chase could not have gone more smoothly.



Bekis dominated again with another half-century (81) and was supported perfectly by Ryan Tulia, who came

into the side to score an unbeaten 72 to secure the bonus-point win with 7 wickets to spare. Round three was another 50-over match against Sydney at Beauchamp Oval.

Things started poorly with both openers gone with the score at 5. Nonetheless, this gave Lachlan Barnsley the opportunity to show his class and maturity, compiling a well-made 60 to rebuild the innings. Barnsley was ably supported through the middle of the innings putting on a 50 run partnership with Josh Claridge.

From there, 21 and 42 to Winsor and Nathan Doyle respectively left the game in the balance at 5-136 when the lead singer of The Publics, Josh Porter, arrived at the crease. Porter proceeded to take the game away from the Tigers, with an innings as well-crafted as his own music.

Porter finished with 51 off 42 deliveries, guiding the Stags to 237. Again, another example of the depth of the side to recover from early trouble to post a good score. In reply, Sydney began well reaching 0-47 before a run-out from Ryan Meppem changed the game.

The Young Stags took 8-55 to all but seal the game with the Tigers 8-102. Nehru continued his fine form taking 2 wickets, while Meppem finished with incredible figures of 4-18 from his 10 overs. All in all, another dominant team outing, winning by 29 runs to remain undefeated.

Round four was a T20 game against Eastern Suburbs as the PG's side returned to Chatswood Oval for the first time this season. The team welcomed Nikhil Ahluwalia into the side for his first appearance of the season. After losing 2 wickets in the first over and slumping to 3-17 early in the innings, Barnsley and Doyle steadied the ship guiding the Stags to 144 from their 20 overs.

Barnsley scored 48 from 36 balls, while Doyle finished with 49 from 39.

In reply, Nehru and Matthew Wright produced a simply astonishing opening spell, leaving Easts reeling at 6-14 after 6 overs. Nehru finished with 2-10 from his 4 overs, while Wright claimed 3-6 from his 4.

The Dolphins limped to 68 from 17 overs, as Chillingworth stunned the world with some mediumpaced bowling not too dissimilar to Classical Legend Stobo himself. Much to the dismay of Tids, Chillingworth ended with 2-2 and proved his worth to the side despite a hand injury that prevented him from bowling his leg-spin.

Starting the season 4/4, the Young Stags arrived at Chatswood to another banquet prepared from Rob Carruthers, preparing the side for another good day. After winning the toss and batting, Sutherland claimed early wickets as the Stags were 3-42 in the latter stages of the first powerplay.

Enter two country kids that were new to the club this season - Josh Claridge and Nathan Doyle. The pair compiled a partnership of 225 nearly breaking the club record PG's partnership of 233 by Steve Colley and Reece Bombas.

Claridge finished with 103 from 123 deliveries while Doyle was out for 129 off 119 balls, to catapult the side to an imposing score of 5-289. Perhaps equally as pleasing from this day was the emergence of the young, tall and seriously quick 17-year-old, Will Rogers. In his first PG's game of the season, Rogers returned figures of 3-40 including the wickets of their best two batsmen.

Meppem starred again with another 3 wickets, while Doyle finished with 2 wickets. Another terrific performance from the Young Stags with a dominant 110 run win. The final round of the regular season was against St George at Hurstville Oval and saw another debutant, Nathan Sequeira.

Bowling first, Nehru and Wright both claimed early wickets allowing a typical "Gordon performance", restricting the opposition through the middle overs with a lot of spin bowling. Meppem took another 2 wickets, Doyle claimed figures of 3-29 from his 10 while Nehru also finished with 2 wickets.

Again, a solid team display with the ball and in the

field restricted St George to 9-199 from their 50 overs. In reply, Bekis and Tulia began the chase superbly with an opening partnership of 91 before Tulia departed for 28.

As the percentage of runs scored in the opening partnership might suggest, Bekis was truly dominant, smashing the bowlers to all parts of the ground with 5 big sixes. Bekis finished with 128* from 130 balls to continue his golden season, guiding the Stags to a comfortable 7 wicket win with 10 overs to spare.

This result saw the Young Stags finish comfortably ahead of the 'Sixers Conference' and first overall in the Poidevin Gray ladder after finishing the regular season undefeated. The semi-final of the Sixers Conference saw a rematch against Mosman, this time at Chatswood Oval.

Unsurprisingly, Nehru and Wright started brilliantly taking the first 3 wickets for just 9 runs. This brought the opposition's two best batsmen to the crease and after a tight 15 overs of sustained pressure, the wickets began to fall, bowling Mosman out for 146 in the 46th over.

Again, all bowlers bowled well with Nehru taking 3-29, Meppem 2-25 and Chillingworth steaming in off the long run to take 2-19. The pattern of the previous run chases continued with an opening partnership of 82 between Tulia (21) and Bekis. Bekis was dismissed for 85 (off 71) in pursuit of his second century of the tournament as the Stags won with 7 wickets and 17 overs to spare.

The Sixers Conference final was hosted by the Stags against UTS North Sydney and after a wet week, the start of play was delayed by a couple of hours with the game reduced to 44 overs each. Bekis hit a 6 in the first over before being caught by a one-handed screamer that set the tone for the rest of the day. Consistent wickets saw the Stags slump to 4-66 despite 31 from Barnsley.

Doyle and Porter began to wrestle back momentum before both were dismissed for 34 with the Young Stags struggling at 8-130. Some big hitting from Meppem (21* off 13) in the last over lifted Gordon to a below-par score of 8-160 off 44 overs. Early wickets, taking chances and a bit of luck would be needed to defend this score. However, this did not occur as the (non)wicket of their best batsmen off a no-ball in the early overs captured that it was just "one of those days". Despite 100% effort from the team, the Stags were comprehensively beaten by 8 wickets bringing an end to the Poidevin Gray season.

The disappointment from the players and the coaching staff was clear, however, the character shown on a very trying day was extremely noteworthy. Despite the 30 drunk Bears supporters hurling abuse all day, each player involved held their chin up and showed the utmost humility.

Unfortunately, the full ability of the side was not on display when it mattered most, however, the character that was shown was admirable. It is clear that the future of the club, on and off the field, is one full of promise. On a personal note, I would also like to express my gratitude to Charles Stobo for his time, mentorship and effort with the squad.

Having someone of his knowledge, ability and experience is priceless, and there is no doubt his PG's coaching record is testament to this. A further thanks must go to Rob Carruthers. I have never seen anyone so prepared, thoughtful and committed to a team environment in my sporting career.

His organisation (including his breakfasts) allowed a group of young, highly disorganised men to arrive on Sunday to play cricket without having to worry about anything else.

Lastly, "The Bull". I have known Andy Baldwin for close to a decade now and his passion for cricket is unrivalled. More than just his scoring, but his contribution and entertainment around the team were appreciated by all. All in all, it was a thoroughly enjoyable season and I look forward to going bigger and better next season!

Thank you to all members from the club who came to support throughout the season and especially to all the players for their contributions!

Then some good hitting from young star Daimon Pin (63*) helped the score to 6 for 304 after 50 overs.

The flat Chatswood pitch would be a challenge to bowl on but Sydney Uni was soon in trouble at 4 for 53 after a hostile opening spell from young Australian star Nick Toohey and Luke Callanan. Unfortunately, with the temperature rising in the afternoon we were quickly in trouble with two bowlers down - due to injury & heat stroke. ND's were always in control of the run chase and despite some late wickets, cruised to victory with 4 overs to spare. Luke Callanan with a magnificent 3-16 off his 10 overs was the pick of our bowlers. Our thoughts quickly turned to how we were going to back up against North Sydney the very next day.

Round 4 v North Sydney at Killara Oval – Win by 2 wickets (and 2 balls)

Match Scores: North Sydney 5-250 (50 overs) - Luke Callanan 1-42 (off 7), Harry Davis-Rice 1-33 (off 7), Karan Katli 0-39 (off 10), Sid Singh 1 23 (off 7), Dylan Ranjan 1-26 (off 8) and Trystan Kennedy 1-8 (3).

Defeated by Gordon 8-251 (49.4 overs) – Trystan Kennedy 29 (off 48), Sidhant Singh 25 (off 28), Jaiden Gray 19 (off 42), Daimon Pin 22 (off 37), Tom Chapman 57 (off 62), Felix Booth 23 (off 36), Sam Schembri-Green 38no (off 30) and Luke Callanan 4no (off 1).

A very exciting win against North Sydney - chasing 250. We lost the toss and were bowling first – which was the last thing we needed after bowling last in the previous days game in 45+ degree heat.

Our bowlers were very loose at the start and we had to really dig deep to keep North Sydney under 250. There were some outstanding efforts from Luke Callanan, Harry Davis-Rice and spinners Trystan Kennedy, Karan Katli and a big effort by young leg spinner Dylan Ranjan who bowled exceptionally well in his 8 overs.

In chasing 250, we effectively needed a run a ball for most of the innings and it was well controlled by vice Skip Tom Chapman (57) until a rash of wickets meant the run rate got out of control. However, some big hitting from Sam Schembri-Green 38 not out (off 30) and Luke Callanan 4 not out (off 1) got us over the line with 2 balls to spare.

Round 5 – Randwick Petersham at Kensington Oval – Loss by 4 wickets (under DL)

Match Scores: Gordon: 9 for 93 (32 overs) Extras 35, Trystan Kennedy 15 (off 24) and Harry Davis-Rice 13 not out (off 15).

Defeated by Randwick Petersham: 4 for 78 (24 overs); Luke Callanan 2-19 (off 5), Karan Katli 1-16 (off 7), and Rohan Watson 1-17 (off 5).

On an overcast and smoky day Randy Petes won the toss and had no hesitation in putting us into bat in this crucial round 5 clash.

At 1 for 35 after 7 overs, things were looking good for a 200+ total (a good score in bowler friendly conditions). However, things quickly went downhill with a series of rash shots, losing 8 wickets for just 25 runs. Some late innings hitting from Harry Davis-Rice 13 not out off 15 balls got us to 9 for 93 when the innings was closed after 32 overs.

Somewhat nonsensically, the Randy Petes total was revised down to 74 off 32 overs. We bowled well and aggressively but without a lot of luck with several plays & misses and a number of very close LBWs and caught behind appeals turned down. In the end Randy Pete's won in 24 overs – 4 down. We were left contemplating what might have been had our top order batted with more patience, application and discipline. Our whole Green Shield campaign now hung in the balance.

Round 6 v Penrith at Penrith – Bonus point Win by 6 wickets (in 23 overs)

Match Scores: Penrith 10-70 (34.5 overs): Nick Toohey 3-8 (off 5), Luke Callanan 2-11 (off 5, Sam Schembri-Green 1-13 (off 6), Karan Katli 2-10 (off 7), Rohan Watson 1-14 (off 8) and Harry Davis-Rice 0-11 (off 4).

Defeated by Gordon 4-73 off 23.4 overs: Jaiden Gray 23no (off 30) and Daimon Pin 11no (off 15). A very good day out, securing a bonus point win over a strong Penrith side. After winning the toss and electing to bowl we needed to start well in this must win game in order to make the finals.

We could not have started any better, securing two wickets in the first over – a brilliant run out by Tom Chapman & Sam Schembri-Green and a wicket from our big quick Nick Toohey. The next 8 wickets came from consistent bowling with Penrith finally out for 70 in 34 overs. Further crucial wickets were taken by Luke Callahan, Rohan Watson (who somehow only got one), Karan Katli and Nick Toohey. Harry Davis Rice also bowled very well and somehow didn't take any wickets. All the bowlers bowled brilliantly.

For the bonus point we needed to score 71 runs in 30 overs. The innings was well controlled by Jaiden Gray with a fine 23 not out and a short cameo by Daimon Pin 11 not out of 15 balls. The campaign was now back on track and looking good going into the last round against Sydney.

Round 7 v Sydney at Drummoyne Oval – Loss by 2 runs

Match Scores: Sydney: 8-180 (50 overs) Nick Toohey 0-28 (off 9), Luke Callanan 1-17 (off 8), Karan Katli 0-24 (off 10), Sam Schembri-Green 1-38 (off 8), Harry Davis-Rice 2-39 (off 8), Rohan Watson 1-27 (off 7) and 3 run outs.

Defeated Gordon 7-178 (50 overs) Tristan Kennedy 67 (off 123), Tom Chapman 35 (off 61), Sam Schembri-Green 24 (off 36) and Jaiden Gray 16 (off 60)

We lost to Sydney by 2 runs on the last ball of the match, after having the upper hand throughout the game. We set up the game well by restricting Sydney to 180 on a good batting deck. Generally, everyone bowled well but the highlight were our three run outs.

The key in this relatively low run chase was to not lose early wickets and have one of the top 4 bat deep. At 2 for 130 after 37 overs we had the game completely in our control. However, despite several good starts, no one really when on with it and wickets started falling regularly (often to rash shots). In the end the pressure was too much for the middle/lower order and we fell agonisingly short (by two runs).

A very difficult way to end our campaign. In the end of lack of stability/consistency in our batting and bowling orders over the short Green Shield season cost the team confidence and ultimately a finals berth.

It was an interesting season with lots of highs and lows (and not much in between) and despite the rollercoaster, the comradery within the playing group remained excellent – which is testimony to the character of our young men. The season certainly challenged us all and hopefully lessons were learnt for future Green Shield campaigns.

NEW BATTING AVERAGE REORD IN SECOND GRADE

A quick scan of our club records on the following page will show that they don't change very often with our oldest record being a first-grade average of 122.75 by the famous Dr. Claude Tozer in 1920-21.

Claude was a decorated hero of World War I fighting both at Gallipoli and on the Western Front in France, having the unusual honour of being a doctor on the front line while at times also being in the firing line as well. In the first four rounds of the 1920-21 season, Claude scored 110, 211, 131 and 39 to total 491 from 4 innings at an average of 122.75. Claude was tragically shot dead in his surgery by a Mrs Mort in December that year. What might have been?

Another long-term record is the 78 wickets in third grade by Rupert Ellsmore, who was also a hero from World War I who received the Military Cross for his bravery at the battle of Mont St.

Quentin in September 1918. Rupert had started with Gordon in 1910 and retired in 1927 with four years in France in the middle. Rupert was also assistance secretary for many years and enlisted for World War II in 1944.

This season, Josh Claridge has taken the second-grade batting average record, batting just 8 times in seconds for 339 runs at an average of 113. This included a score of 117 not out in Round 1. The record was previously held by Brad Rasool.

Congratulations to Josh for his excellent season and we are sure you will appreciate the stature of the list of people you have now joined.


